MRS. HENRY FIELD TO WED A. R. FIELD TREE. Cable Reports Chicago Merchant's Widow Engaged to Lucy Beatty's Son, Her First Cousin.

Chicago, May 1—A cablegram from London informed Chicago friends that the engagement of Mrs. Nancy Perkins Field, widow of Henry Field, to Arthur Ronald Lambert Field Tree, son of Lady Beatty, wife of Great Britain's highest admiral, is soon to be announced.

Mr. Tree is Mrs. Field's first cousin by marriage. He is a grandson both of Lambert Tree, pioneer Chicagoist, and of Marshall Field, 1st.

The two old Chicago families were first united when Lambert Tree's son married Marshall Field's daughter. Later Mrs. Tree was divorced and was remarried to Lord Beatty. Their home is at Brooks-by-Hill, Leicester.

Mrs. Field and Mr. Tree have been spending some weeks with Mrs. Field's aunt, Lady Astor at Cliveden, where it is said their brief courtship took place. Mrs. Field was Miss Nancy Perkins of the second generation of the famous Virginia beauties known as the “Langhorne girls.” Her mother was Miss Ivy Langhorne, the second of the sisters, and said to have been the original model for the “Gibson Girl.” The other sisters are Lady Astor, recently elected to the British parliament; Mrs. Charles Dana Gibson of New York; Mrs. Reginald Brooks of New York and Mrs. W. W. L. Phipps of London.

COMING IN SLOWLY

There are many people in the city who held beer licenses last year who have not yet renewed them for the present year and who hold themselves open to a fine of at least \$50 should they sell beer today or before getting a new license or a receipt for the fee. It was said at the office of the chief liquor inspector at noon that twenty-eight city applications had been received so far; last year there were ninety-two licenses issued. Paris, May 1—The government has decided to send a mission to represent it at Rome during the celebration of the sanctification of Joan of Arc. Gabriele Hanotiaux, president of the Franco-Anarchist committee, will head the committee, which will include the Count De Chambrun. The committee will leave for Rome on next Tuesday.

MAKES AIR TRIP FROM MIAMI TO NEW YORK

New York, May 1—An air flight from Miami, Fla., to New York, with one stop, in fifteen hours and thirty-five minutes flying time, was made yesterday by the passenger seaplane “Miss Miami,” piloted by Harry Rogers of the American Flying Club.

AMUNDSEN NOT TO GIVE UP THE FIGHT

London, May 1—Ronald Amundsen, Norwegian Arctic explorer, has not abandoned his expedition, but after his impending visit to Nome, Alaska, he intends to enter the ice pack around Wrangel Island, off the northern coast of Eastern Siberia, and thence drift across the Polar sea, says a despatch to the Times from Christiania.

SCOUR THE WOODS FOR MISSING TAXI DRIVER

Providence, R. I., May 1—Two thousand or more mill and factory employes of this city and Taunton, Mass., will devote their Saturday half holiday to a search of the woods and swamps in the vicinity of Taunton for the body of Oliver L. Eklund, a Providence taxi-cab driver, who is believed to have been murdered on Sunday night by two of his passengers.

ITALY TO RESTRICT THE USE OF AUTOMOBILES

Rome, May 1—A royal decree is soon to be published in Italy prohibiting the use of automobiles, in view of the serious shortage of petrol, and the high rate of exchange, according to a report from Rome.

NEW RATES OF FEES OF WOODSTOCK, ONT., DOCTORS.

Woodstock, May 1—The Woodstock Medical Association has adopted a new schedule of rates, to become effective May 1. Henceforth visits between 8 a. m. and 7 p. m. will be \$2 instead of \$1.50; 7 p. m. to 9 p. m., \$3; 9 p. m. to 8 a. m., \$4, instead of \$3. Country calls will be \$2 each, plus 75 cents a mile. Obstetrical calls will be \$25. During May, June, July, August and September the doctors will close their offices on Wednesday at 12 o'clock.
