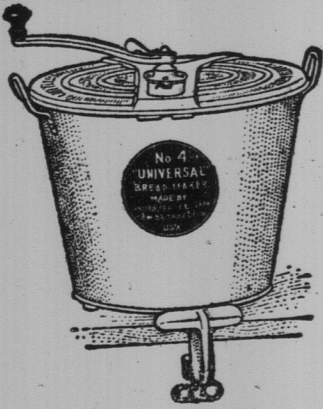

NEW SUGAR ORDERS.
Ottawa, April 26—The Canada Food Board today issued an order strictly limiting holdings of sugar by persons other than cane sugar manufacturers, providing for seizure and forfeiture of sugar held in excess of the quantities prescribed under the order, and making a violation of the order an offense subject to penalties which shall not be less than \$100, and may run as high as \$1,000 or to imprisonment for a period up to three months, or both fine and imprisonment.

GENERAL MacDONNELL MAY HAVE SUMMER LEAVE OF ABSENCE

Lieut.-Col. A. H. Powell Likely To Be Acting General Officer Commanding This District

Lieut.-Col. A. H. Powell will in all probability be acting general officer commanding military district No. 7 during the expected absence of Brigadier-General MacDonnell, C.M.G., D.S.O. This is a report that is now current in military circles. General MacDonnell has not enjoyed a leave of absence except in case of illness since he returned from the western front, and it is understood that he will receive the permission of the military authorities to take a well-earned rest during the summer, possibly extending over a period of three months. Military men say that in the event of this change taking place, this military district could not be left in better hands.
