MOURN DEATH OF BROTHER OF THE QUEEN

King George and Queen Mary To Go To Sandringham

HEALTHY TRADE SIGN

Remarkable Increase in British Shipping—Home Rule and Other Matters Political—New Labor Exchange Promises Well—A Great Auto Show

Times London Letter

London, Oct. 28.—The lamented death of Prince Francis of Teck has left a gap in the inner circles of London society and especially will it upset the winter arrangements of the court. The queen has suffered a blow by the unexpected death of a favorite brother, and now it is settled there shall be no court functions for the present, and that the king and queen shall go to their Norfolk home at Sandringham and remain there till the end of the year.

It is probable, that before their withdrawal they will visit their cousin, the young lieutenant, King of Portugal, at Wood Norton, the country house of the Duke of Orleans. This visit can in no sense compromise the queen's position. The British government has recognized the new regime and the visit of King George to the ex-king of Portugal is to be regarded as strictly private and a family affair.

In November the King and Queen of Norway with their little son are to pay their customary visit to England. They will be at Sandringham probably for Christmas.

An interesting and very unusual conference is to be held at St. Paul's Cathedral a week hence, when the Archbishop of London will preside over a company of clergy and distinguished physicians who will discuss the relation of religion and medical science and health.

There is a disposition in high class medical circles to tolerate if they do not approve of faith healing and Christian Science. In fashionable circles Christian Science appears to be gaining ground, although among the people generally it is regarded as the "fad" of well-to-do medical men are willing to humor.

Healthy Trade Sign. A healthy sign of the progress of British trade is the remarkable increase in shipping. Shipbuilders are becoming busy and tramp steamers are in great request. The selling prices of tramp cargo steamers is advanced some 20 per cent. The passenger traffic of the Kingdom has increased enormously also, and this year, ended September, the number of passengers is more than 215,000.

In tariff reform and free trade circles the sensation of the hour is the offer of the Canadian provinces to accept the "Montreal Star" to spend some £2,000 to pay the expenses of British delegates who may enjoy in Canada the same facilities which recently have become so popular among certain politicians. The proposed tour of investigation is being undertaken by the six conservative M.P.'s including Messrs. Geo. Lloyd and James Macdonald.

Free traders are tempted to organize a counter campaign in Canada. However, that may be, Canadians cannot complain of the interest taken in the old country. Although the practical independence of the dominion is abundantly recognized, it is apparent that a considerable influence in British politics as powerful as if she were represented in an imperial federation.

As to Home Rule. The series of letters in "The Times" signed "Pacifists" have created considerable discussion because the notion has gone abroad among political opponents that the Daily Telegraph, and other papers, are preparing for the uncompromising Unionist section of the North of Ireland. The Canadian example is winning English Unionists to consider some form of imperial federation which will practically give Ireland the same status as Canada and the self-governing states of the empire.

So far there is too little understanding of Canada's opinion of the plan which Englishmen may regard as approving. If Englishmen were to regard so approvingly the inclusion of Ireland having local government subject to control at Westminster, Canada will have something to say, and it may appear that the empire overseas cannot do anything for itself, but rather distrustful of the Ball as top Sawyer and boss.

Irish Nationalists and Mr. Redmond must not whitewash the independence which Canada enjoys and which Ireland has longed for. It is curious to know what Mr. Asquith is going to say when parliament opens on November 15. Well-informed men are saying there will be no full revelation of the doings of the conference, but that at the lord mayor's banquet in the city on November 9 by way of testing the trend of public opinion.

New Labor Exchange. In the heart of the city this week has been the working of the new labor exchange opened close to Ludgate Circus. This is a new registry office, successful all over the labor centres in the working districts but men of business till now have seen no sign of their usefulness at their own doors. The trial has had very pleasing results. There is a daily throng of artisans.

FAMOUS GEMS OF PROSE

IT'S THE VITAL SPIRIT THAT INSPIRES

By Henry Gratian

From speech in address to the king regarding appointment of additional revenue commissioners for Ireland, in the Irish house of commons, Feb. 1, 1909.

WE combat a project to govern this country by corruption; it is not like the supremacy of the British parliament—a thunderbolt—nor like the twenty propositions, a mine of artifice; but without the force of one, or the fraud of the other, will answer all the purposes of both.

I have read books on the subject of government; I have read books on the subject of British government; I have heard of the different principles or foundations of authority; the patriarchal right, the martial right, the conventional rights of kings, the sacred rights of the people. I have heard of different principles, applicable to different forms of government—virtue to a republic, honor to a monarchy—but the principles of our ministry, or rather, indeed, their policy, which is a dissolution of all principles, can only be read in the ruin of the nation! You have too lately recovered your liberties, not to know wherein exists their virtue; it is not merely in the laws; these the lawyers may pervert to the jargon of slavery; these the lawyers may explain away; they did so in England; they did so in the case of ship-money; they did so in Ireland; they did so in the case of embargoes, without authority from parliament; in the case of the British supremacy, and in the case of the regency; for great lawyers, constitutional questions, have given not legal, but political answers in favor of their great and mighty client, the monarch. But if you attend to them you may sit in the chair, the members all around, and the sergeant-at-arms at your back, and yet not be a parliament; for you will want the spirit and energy of a parliament. No; it is the vital spirit that inspires, the independency that actuates; the principle of independency, which is implied in your constitution, is registered in your laws, passed in England in the time of William; they were conceived to guard the rights of electors against the influence of the treasury; and the purity of the elected against the influence of the treasury; and they were conceived to preserve the popular balance of the constitution and to form a sort of fence or barrier against those rank majorities which not seldom swarm from the hive of the treasury and blacken the seats of the senate; and yet these were feeble laws. Lord Brougham complains of them; he expostulates with the framers of the revolution; they had, says he, guarded liberty against open force; but they had secured her against the assaults of clandestine influence; here she was against a secret enemy, against a vulnerable point. Parliamentary integrity is your palladium, with it "You need not fear the force of the enemy; no Agamemnon, no Ulysses can invade you; without it Theristes himself will be sufficient for the purpose."

NEW CANADIAN NEWS SERVICE FIRST OF YEAR. Toronto, Nov. 8.—The representatives of the daily press of Canada, who have been in session in the board of trade rooms for the past two days, have completed arrangements for the launching of Canadian Press Limited, a co-operative organization, which will control the service of the Associated Press in Canada.

It was decided that the organization should extend over the entire dominion, with subsidiary organizations for handling such local or interprovincial news service as may be agreed upon in British Columbia, three prairie provinces, Ontario and Quebec as one group, and the three maritime provinces as another group.
