Protestant Orphanage Directorate Presents Picture to D. C. Clark

Later Comments on Denominational Contributions to Maintain Little Ones.

At yesterday's meeting of the N. B. Protestant Orphanage Home directors a handsome framed life-size picture of the institution was presented to D. C. Clark, president. It was announced that the directors would be pleased to show any interested through the buildings at any time.

Rev. W. J. Bevis led the opening devotions. L. P. D. Tilley paid a glowing tribute to Mr. Clark, who had given unstintingly of his time and means to the institution and for whom the whole new building was a lasting memorial.

**WOMAN RESCUED
AT BATHURST PIER**

Gilbert Steever Saves Her as She Clings to Face of Wharf.

BATHURST, May 11—The timely arrival of a motor boat saved the life of Mrs. Margaret Smith Sunday morning. When Gilbert Steever was passing the Gloucester Lumber Company's wharf about 9 o'clock he noticed what he thought to be a woman clinging to the face of the wharf. He called to some men at the head of the wharf and together they assisted Mrs. Smith to the top of the wharf. They summoned Dr. Duncan, who had her removed to her home.

Mr. Tilley then presented Mr. Clark a large photograph of himself handsomely framed and bearing a tablet with the following inscription: "D. C. Clark, president of the new Brunswick Protestant Orphanage Home, presented by 1265 fellow members of the board of directors."

Mr. Tilley requested that this portrait be hung in the orphanage.

Mr. Clark, in speaking of the treasurer's statement, said it was a shame and a disgrace the smallness of the denominational contributions to maintenance and he was thoroughly "disgusted" with it.

L. P. D. Tilley, reporting for the permanent home committee, told of the purchase of the Manchester property on the Manawagosh River, where a splendid institution had been erected; the payments to date being \$108,048 and accommodation being now provided for 84 girls and 88 boys. The overdraft of \$22,000 would be wiped out when payments now pledged were received.

Mr. Tilley, as chairman of the finance committee, reported the endowment fund income would be increased by \$398 as the result of re-investment of funds and the addition of recent donations and bequests.

**WESTERN MEMBERS
TO VISIT MARITIMES**

Fork to Head Party of 60 to Travel in The Three Provinces.

OTTAWA, May 11—Every western province will be represented in the party of members of Parliament organized by S. R. Gordon to visit the Maritime Provinces during the Victoria Day recess.

The party will be headed by Robert Forke, Progressive leader, and will total between 60 and 70, including members, wives of members, and newspaper men. Invitations are being received from points all over the Maritimes, but the itinerary at present decided upon calls for the party to leave Ottawa Wednesday, May 20, stopping at Bathurst, Moncton and Edmundston, New Brunswick; Colchester and Pictou counties in Nova Scotia, and thence to Prince Edward Island, leaving Charlottetown for Ottawa on Monday night, May 25.

**VICTORIAN NURSES
TRYING NEW SYSTEM**

Reside in Own Quarters Instead of General Home—Discuss Plans to Aid Patients.

It is the hope of the Victorian Order of Nurses in Saint John to be able to supply necessary bedside utensils to patients who are unable to procure such sickroom comforts for themselves and are in urgent need of them.

To this end cupboards have been installed in the V. O. N. rooms in the Health Centre to be storage space for the utensils and an endeavor will be made to obtain as many gifts towards the desired emergency supplies as possible.

A gift of infant clothing has already been received from Centenary church friends and at the meeting of the Board of Directors of the V. O. N. yesterday afternoon this gift was gratefully acknowledged.

L. W. Simms, president, was in the chair and Mrs. Margaret Lawrence was present for the first time since her election to the board. A hearty welcome was extended to Mrs. Lawrence and reference was made to the splendid service which her mother, the late Mrs. F. V. Ellis, had given the order while on the directorate for many years.

NEW SYSTEM TRIED.

A new system is now being tried out in the V. O. N. work, each of the nurses residing in her own quarters instead of all being together in a V. O. N. home. There was some discussion with regard to the way in which the new plan is working out.

Reports of the month were very gratifying. Miss H. B. MacKay, new superintendent, was cordially greeted and her report showed that there had been a total of 1,638 visits including 421 infant welfare visits, and 1,048 for nursing care. The total number of patients visited in their homes was 237. At the 15 clinics held the attendance of babies was 140. From the Women's Council free milk fund the nurses had given out tickets for 1,339 quarts of milk which had been distributed among 71 babies.

600,000 IN LABOR PACT.

LONDON, May 11—A trade union pact between the Amalgamated Engineers and the Union Transport Workers Federation has been entered into with a view to giving mutual assistance in case of labor troubles. There are 600,000 workers affected by the pact.
