A STIFF FIGHT.

The Insurrection Is Spreading Rapidly in Bulgaria.

One Hundred and Fifty Revolutionists Were Killed in the Fight on August 9th.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 12.—One hundred and fifty revolutionists were killed, according to official Turkish reports, in the fighting at Sorovitch, Aug. 9th. The same despatches which have been communicated to the Russian and Austrian embassies, state that the insurrectionary movement is increasing daily.

P. R. A. MATCHES

To Be Held at Sussex Vale on Aug. 18th, 19th, and 20th.

The 37th annual prize meeting of the N. B. Provincial Rifle Association will take place on the 18th, 19th and 20th of this month at Sussex Vale.

Tuesday morning the nursery and maiden, the maiden and the Donville matches will be shot. The first is for a cup presented by Lieut.-Col. T. G. Logie, vice-president, and is open only to efficient members of the active militia of New Brunswick, retired officers and men who have never won a first prize at any provincial or Dominion competition.

On Wednesday morning the association challenge cup and the Transvaal cup will be shot for at 200, 500 and 600 yards.

Thursday morning a silver antique jug, presented by Lieut.-Col. McLean, president, and the York and King's challenge pitcher will be shot for at 800 yards.

On Thursday afternoon the Pugsley cup will be shot for at 800 yards, by all members and associate members.

The maiden aggregate is for \$25, presented by Lieut.-Col. McLean, and is open to all competitors who have never attended a previous meeting of the association.

MR. BLAIR AND THE GOVERNMENT.

The Foolish Railway Policy Condemned By The Ex-Minister In a Most Able Speech.

Hon. A. G. Blair last night spoke over four hours on the insurrectionary traffic with its easy grades, as was shown by the fact that it could carry traffic 269 miles farther than the C. P. R., carrying heavier loads, and yet make better time.

Mr. Blair was determined to stand by the Intercolonial. He was surprised that the people of Moncton should wish for this road. Moncton would be side-tracked, and the workshops would be dismantled.

Mr. Blair estimated the cost of the road from Moncton to Quebec at \$5,000,000, pointed out that the Grand Trunk Pacific people were not putting any money in the enterprise, and that the burden placed upon the country was likely to embarrass the taxpayers.

Mr. Blair admitted the necessity for a western road, but pointed out that after two years' consideration the government had guaranteed the bonds of the road owned by Messrs Mackenzie and Mann. If the government really wanted to secure a road which would guarantee freight to Canadian ports, they should have continued the Intercolonial to Georgian Bay.

Mr. Blair referred to the claim that the road could be used as a common railway highway. It was misleading the people to make them believe that various railways would use this road in common.

THE BANANA CROP

Great Damage Done in the Island of Jamaica.

The Markets Here Will Not be Affected As Bananas Come From Other Islands As Well.

KINGSTON, Ja., Aug. 10.—(Delayed in transmission.)—The hurricane, only the fringe of which struck the western end of Jamaica yesterday, and which it was thought had passed, instead of proceeding to the northward, veered to the south early this morning and struck Jamaica with its full force, inflicting damage which it will take years to repair.

E. A. Goodwin said this morning that the banana market would hardly be affected this year, as the season is about over. May, June and July are the three great banana months.


