SHE'D USE A GUN TO GET SUFFRAGE

Also Miss Henrietta Crossman
is in Favor of Battering
Down Congress' Doors

Well Known Actress, Having Darned Stock-
ings and Brought Up Children,
is Qualified.

NEW YORK, May 7.—Miss Henrietta Crossman was the principal speaker on the subject of the equal franchise before the William Lloyd Garrison Equal Rights Association in the house of Mrs. Peter Fogarty, No. 315 West 100th street.

Miss Crossman said that since she had brought up children and darned stockings she presumed her right as a really woman to have the vote was not to be questioned.

All the troubles of this world are laid at the doors of women," she said. "If a woman dresses well, every one says her husband is being ruined by her extravagance. If a woman does not dress well everybody wonders how her husband can live with her."

"One hears a great deal of the chivalry of men, but except in the drawing room it is rarely to be seen. I ought to know something of man's chivalry for I have been at work since I was sixteen years old and have been ed to care for many persons, and after my experience I say, let us have equal rights and more justice, we will do without the chivalry. My husband agrees with me in this. He is much as a suffragist as I am."

"The women have come about this suffrage business to politics. All the women who believe in it should march on Washington and batter down the doors of Congress to obtain their rights. When I go into the streets and see the ignorant foreign men who are permitted to vote while I am deprived of the right it is humiliating that I feel I'd like to get a gun and fight for myself."

"Only the other night at a dinner a little man who didn't know me any shoulder said that if women were permitted to vote they would lose their charm. Such a remark from a man gave me a choking sensation."

Miss Crossman advised women to organize an attack on indecent theatrical and other posters.

Mrs. Harry B. Hastings, president of the League, announced that on May 27, which is the birthday of John Ward Howe, the league will take the suffragette petition into the streets and hold up the passersby for signatures.

WILL USE GUN AT BEGINNING

OTTAWA, May 6.—The dispatch sent out from Montreal that a project for the electrification of the section of the National Transcontinental, between Quebec and Montreal has been placed before the government, is not confirmed by the railway department. It is pointed out that in view of the easily available supplies of coal available in the New Brunswick section of the road there would not be so much benefit from the electrification of that section as there would be for that between Quebec and Montreal, but inasmuch as the electrification of trunk line railways is still in its infancy, the Transcontinental will announce its intention to coal for the first few years at least.

FRIGHTENED, YOUNG MAN SLEEPS; REFUSES TO WAKE

Physicians Puzzled by Strange Case Which
Refused to Respond to Any
Treatment.

PHILADELPHIA, May 6.—When Louis Cohen, a young Russian, who boards with Hyman Weinstein, at 608 Green street, is frightened, he is in the Roosevelt Hospital and is sleeping as though wound up for a month to come.

The case is one of the most puzzling the hospital physicians say, that they have come across. Every effort has been made to awaken him without success. To electric shocks he has proved impervious. Douches of ice water have not disturbed him, nor have baths of almost scalding water. Not even the pricking of pins has served to rouse him, and the doctors have decided now to sit down and wait until the young man has finished his nap.

A peculiar feature of Cohen's affliction is that he seems to be able to sleep without food for an indefinite period, without suffering. Three months ago, when he dropped into a daze the last time he was frightened, he slept for two weeks on a stretch. When he finally awoke, he dressed, picked up his dinner bucket and went to work as though nothing had happened.

This time Cohen's nap was superinduced by an experience he had with a policeman. He was out late Monday night and did not seek his home until 3 o'clock yesterday morning. When he reached the house he found his key forgotten in his key. Accordingly, he pounded on the door, and while waiting for some one to open, was grasped by a policeman.

"What are you doing here?" the cop asked gruffly, Cohen trembled. The appearance of Weinstein saved him further trouble, but he staggered, Weinstein says, and was barely able to reach his bed. Then he threw himself down, half-dressed, and went sound to sleep.

PROULX NOW PLAINLY ACCUSED OF GRAFTING

Sensational Feature to Yesterday's Proulx
Inquiry — Witness Declares Proulx
Received \$1,000 Rake-off.

MONTREAL, Q., May 6.—That Alderman Proulx, chairman of the police committee, received a thousand dollars when the city purchased a boiler from Pierre le Claire, to be converted into a police station, was the sensational feature of today's evidence in the police inquiry.

The charge was made by Fred le Claire, manager of the Theatre Francaise, who was formerly a tenant of Pierre le Claire, and who sold the building at a price of twenty-five per cent, above the greatest value that could be put upon it by real estate experts. He swore that Pierre le Claire told him that if the deal went through that Alderman Proulx was to get a thousand dollars for his influence in making the sale, and that furthermore Pierre le Claire was to have a situation in the water department as a foreman. The deal did go through and le Claire got his situation. Today committee endeavored to trace the money after it had been received by le Claire. In accounting for it, he gave some rather flimsy excuses which his friends forming a considerable party, as well as large descriptions to election funds. The matter is to be again under consideration tomorrow. This is the first direct charge of grafting made against an Alderman.

ATTACKS ON DR. PUGSLEY COLLAPSED EARLY--HIS VINDICATION COMPLETE

OTTAWA, May 6.—At five o'clock this afternoon the opposition attack on Hon. Dr. Pugsley, which had been continued from last night by Dr. Crockett in a five hour speech during the morning and afternoon sittings, suddenly collapsed. The retreat was sounded, and the members who had been told that the debate would continue well on into the night, the opposition allowed Mr. Crockett's resolution to be put to a vote. It may have been that they feared any further discussion of the report would only lead to a further vindication of Dr. Pugsley, or it may have been, as is generally stated, that the Liberal members who, relying on an arrangement made by the government and opposition whips that there would be several more speakers on each side, were not within call when the division bells rang. At any rate the vote came with unexpected suddenness, and as a result the normal government majority of 48 was reduced to 27, the majority of the opposition was 21.

The Minister of Public Works was turned down by a vote of 90 to 63 on a straight party division. The smallness of the majority, however, is of no practical significance, as every Liberal absentee has already taken steps to put himself on record as behind Dr. Pugsley to a man.

TURGEON FOLLOWS.

HERE'S HOW INDIANAPOLIS BROUGHT THE CITY'S GAS TRUST TO ITS KNEES

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., May 7.—This city thinks 60 cents is enough to pay for 1,000 cubic feet of gas. The local gas trust, owned by eastern capitalists, refused to meet the demand of the people's committee, paying \$400 to \$500 a share. Of course, all the trust got for its money was the idle plant and the business of the streets. And the stockholders of the independent company received, from practically worthless stock, \$4 to \$6 for every \$1 invested. How's that for rubbing it into a trust?

But the end is not yet. The trust overlooked the fact that the charter of the consumers' company left the control of the company's affairs in the hands of a board of directors who were appointed by a board of trustees.

When natural gas was discovered in Indiana some twenty years ago, a group of public-spirited citizens formed a "Consumers Gas Co." to sell gas at cost, by an assessment plan. Any excess in excess was to go into a dividend fund. These citizens formed a company and took stock at \$100 a share.

The Indianapolis Gas Co., the foreign owned trust, was in trouble at once. It had to reduce its price to meet competition. Of course the people favored their own company and the trust was up against it until, one company was a success and the other was a failure. Then the people were compelled to fall back upon the trust, and it immediately waxed fat and easy again and sold gas at \$1. It also piled up millions from the sale of stock, watered down its shares.

During the seventeen years that the people ran their own company they proved the value of public ownership of a public utility. The stockholders in the company took out in dividends \$5 for every dollar they had invested, and they were the city's cheapest

gas a city has ever had. When the natural supply failed, the people made it into their heads to manufacture the artificial article, bought up three-fourths of the stock of the people's company, paying \$400 to \$500 a share. Of course, all the trust got for its money was the idle plant and the business of the streets. And the stockholders of the independent company received, from practically worthless stock, \$4 to \$6 for every \$1 invested. How's that for rubbing it into a trust?

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BOY IS THE ACCUSER.

WAVE OF DEGENERACY.

The reported extent of crime in Pittsburgh indicates that something in the nature of a wave of degeneracy is sweeping the city.

The worst of the situation is to be exploded when the police have trailed the members and visitors to various club houses throughout the city. These club houses are the headquarters of the degenerates, and it is said, form the nucleus of the singular vices which are shocking Pittsburgh. REQUEST FOR A LAM GRANT NOT SUPPORTED

OTTAWA, May 6.—The Western Liberal members in caucus today, unanimously decided that they would not support the request from Winnipeg for a grant of \$250,000 of federal funds in the West, to be divided to financing the proposed work of the Selkirk Centennial celebration at Selkirk, 1912. They believe in adhering strictly to the government policy of the land for the settler only and will support instead a proposition for a liberal cash subsidy for exhibition.

At the request of the Imperial war office officials in charge of Lord Roberts Rifle Shooting Competition for members of cadet corps in all parts of the empire, to be held in England on Empire Day, Canada will send two cadets across the Atlantic. The militia department will announce in a few days the names of youthful militiamen selected to represent the Dominion, one of whom will be an English-speaking and the other French-speaking.

The board has been very much alive recently and it didn't believe that people should pay 30 cents for gas that might be sold for 60 cents. The board told the people about it and the people elected a mayor who promised to give the trust a fight.

The mayor exercised an old option that the city held upon the consumers' plant. The city thus took the mains back from the trust and a new company, the Citizens Gas Co., was formed to take the mains off the city's hands. This was done. The people subscribed \$425,000 for this purpose and now the Citizens company is in full power and is under franchise agreement to make and sell gas for 60 cents. The matter has been brought to the supreme court by the trust, but the people have won invariably.

Last week artificial gas was turned into the old mains and the trust-bought gas is running hoar. Viewed, but you should hear the trust scream "bloody murder." It declares that 60-cent gas is impossible. The people answer: "Of course 60-cent gas is impossible for you, because you are trying to pay dividends on an ocean of watered stock. Our company can make and sell special gas because we have no watered stock."

It is predicted that the trust will finally meet the situation by reducing its price to 60 cents, and, to do this, it will probably be compelled to recognize and reduce its stock. The people, however, pledge their support to the new company.

PITTSBURGH SHOCKED BY SCANDAL; THREE MEN UNDER ARREST

Prominent Persons Said to be Involved by
Stories Told by Boys—Doctor
a Prisoner.

PITTSBURGH, May 6.—Scandal-ridden Pittsburgh is about to attract the country's attention again through the exposure of degradation and shame which has stirred the city as it never has been stirred before. Three arrests have been made, and more are to come. Among those in custody is James R. Mason, known as "Doc," a well known pugilistic promoter, Mason was arrested in New York, and is now in the Tombs.

Dr. Charles McDonald, a widely-known practitioner, with offices in the Pittsburgh Life Building, is another prisoner; the third is John Heller, a young man about town.
