OLDEST CHURCH IN MADA ASKA **COMPLETE LOSS**

One of the oldest landmark in the prevince disappeared on Saturday morning, October 22nd, when the Roman Catholic Church at St. Bazil, built in1860, was completely destroyed by fire.

Mass was held at 7.30 in the morning, when everything was in order but by 9.30 smoke was seen issuing from the building, and the main body of the church was discovered to be full of smoke.

The Edmundston Fire Brigade and he C. N. R., fire train were early at the scene of the disaster, but aided by a strong wind, the fire gained leadway rapidly, and in spite of valuant efforts, the church was soon reduced to a mass of smoldering ruins, for want of water.

A Model Coach **Building Contest** Again, next year

WILBROD COTE TO COMPETE

Oshawa, Ont., October 17. — Two university scholarships valued at \$5,000 each will be given the two best boy craftsmen in Canada next year, as additional awards in the Annual Fisher Body Guild Competition in model coach building work. R. S. McLaughlin, president of the Canadian Section of the Guild, made the announcement here today. This creates a total fund of \$30,000 to be awarded in scholarships in Canada and the United States and increases to \$85,000 the Guild awards for the presen tyear's competition. All six scholarships entitle the winners to a four-year course in any accredited university of their own choice. Oshawa, Ont., October 17. - Tw

Trips to the Chicago World's Fair for two boys in each Canadian Guild district and each state of America, and 1126 gold awards ranging from \$15 to \$100, are offered by the Guild in addition to the scholarships.

The purpose of the Guild in increasing the number of scholarships.

Mr. McLaughlin explained, was to extend the opportunity which the coach-building competition offers to boys of Canada. Four scholarships were awarded during the Guild's initial year, when the competition was limited to boys of the United States were awarded during the Guild's initial year, when the competition was limited to boys of the United States were were offered again last year with Canadian boys competing too. With a year's experience behind them, theboys of the United States were able by a narrow margin to sweep the entir estate in the scholarships to take care of both countries. There will be one scholarship for the highest Junior Division boy in Canada, and one for the highest Senior Division box.

The awards are made on the basis of the skill shown by boys in constructing a miniature replica of Napoleon's Royal Carriage from plans furnished by the Guild. There are no fees or dues in the Guild.
