CLOSING LETTER  
ON MONTREAL  
EXCHANGE

Montreal, March 25.—The Montreal market right from the opening gave signs that the turn had been reached and after a period of continued liquidation higher prices were in evidence right through the list. This applied more particularly to the leaders which had been showing the biggest declines during the past couple of weeks. Sentiment here was helped to a considerable extent by the advance of over three points which had occurred in C. P. R. on Monday in New York when the local market was closed. London today held the advance made in New York yesterday in C. P. R. The stock after holding firm at the advanced prices through the morning, selling at 226 5/8 to 226 7/8, showed greatest strength in the last hour when it sold as high as 228 in Wall Street.

The leader of the Montreal list was Montreal Power, the stock opening higher at 215 compared with 214 1/4 on Thursday. In the morning session it closed 215 7/8 after being as high as 216 1/4 and in the afternoon was up to 217 1/4.

Another high priced stock to make a big advance was Laurentide, the first transaction in this stock occurring at 208 as compared with 204 on Thursday and advancing in the day to 212.

Brazilian ruled firm in the early trading around 94 to 94 3/4 and in the afternoon sold at 95.

McDonald common opening at 55, gained to 57 1/4, with transactions later at 56 3/4. It will be announced in the evening papers that the common will declare a dividend of 5 p. c. Dominion Steel Corporation common opened firmer at 49 and gained to 50 1/2 with later transactions fractionally lower.

R. & O. was off to 109 and Scotia was quoted X. D. and was offered down to 75 1/2 equal to 77 with the dividend on.

There continued to be considerable enquiry for bonds, prices ruling slightly firmer, Canamers selling 101, C-90 1-2, and Textile 100.

In the unlisted department National Brick featured, advancing to 64 1/4 compared with 63 3/4 at the close last Thursday. The advance in the stock was said to be in anticipation of an annual statement which the company will issue today or tomorrow.

National Brick has declared 5 per cent. dividend also bonus of 1 1/4 p. c. payable April 16th initial dividend payable June 1st.

CLOSING STOCK

New York, March 25.—The rather favorable development over the past week in the foreign financial situation and Saturday's encouraging bank exhibit were the broad influences underlying the further improvement in stocks today. There was evidence of a considerable veering of sentiment in favor of at least a fair temporary up reaction and not a few operators who have been persistently bearish for a long time abruptly reversed their position today. The technical position of the market seems strong enough to warrant a good recovery should financial developments continue favorable but it is as yet too early to say if this turn has been definitely reached. It cannot be again said that the recent liquidation in Germany with the resultant moderate relaxation in the money tension at Berlin has greatly improved the prospect but it remains to be seen whether the demands for money from the German capital will be renewed after the next quarterly settlement. Likewise the reduction of \$35-million in the loans of the local clearing house banks is reassuring but reserves are still far from a reasonable surplus and attempts to start an upward movement would be exceedingly ill-timed.

PRICE'S LETTER  
ON COTTON  
MARKET

New York, N. Y., March 25.—About the only feature today has been some evening up of March commitments. With March showing a premium of about 37 points over May, a considerable line of straddles has been done and the selling of March estimated at about 20,000 to 25,000 sales promoted a little flurry of liquidation in other old crop positions. The offerings, however, were well enough taken up by Wall Street shorts to maintain the March premium and after showing a net loss of five or six points on old crop positions, prices rallied three or four points from the lowest. New crop month was dull and relatively steady. The market opened steady at an advance of 1 to 4 points in response to better cables than expected, but soon showed signs of using the flurry of old crop liquidation and during the late forenoon ruled about 1 to 6 points net lower. General business was very quiet being restricted to some extent by poor wire service. Exports were heavier today and interior stocks are losing more rapidly.

SEED RED CLOVER  
AND ALFALFA SCARCE

(J. C. MACKINTOSH &amp; CO.)

Interviewing the Weekly Globe and Canada Farmer, recently, George H. Clark, Dominion seed commissioner, said:

The seed supply for cereal grain crops in Eastern Canada this spring will be cause for some concern. This fact is due to the great scarcity resulting from unfavorable weather conditions of the past year. Probably not less than 15,000 bushels of seed oats will this year be imported from the prairie provinces.

It would be of great advantage had we a special commercial grade for seed oats. The principal difficulty in securing the handling of a special commercial grade is in securing separate elevator space for it. The supply of richly seed was never more abundant and seldom cheaper than this year. The quality is good, although much of the seed is discolored, owing to the wet weather. Prices for timothy will range from \$5 to \$6.50 a hundredweight.

The supply of Canadian-grown red clover is unusually scarce; the quality is inferior and the prices high. Climatic conditions of last year produced an abnormal growth of vegetation; the bloom was very irregular and in consequence much red clover seed was immature. Practically all the Mammoth red clover seed is being imported and not over five per cent. of our own Canadian-grown red clover seed this year will grade No. 1.

With those seeds, which have, under the seed control act, to be graded, according to definite standards of quality, the demand, which was a few years ago for medium seed down, is today for medium up, with a very large proportion of the call for No. 1 seed. Canadian farmers, when they know they are getting the best are willing to pay high price for it.

Canadian-grown alfalfa is greatly in demand because of its increased hardness, yet as a consequence of bad weather conditions, there are not one hundred bushels of Canadian-grown alfalfa seed in Ontario. The alfalfa seed crop last year was a complete failure.

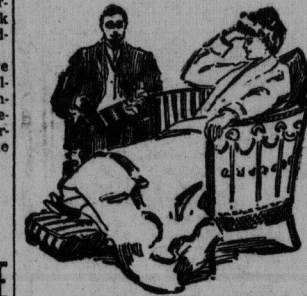

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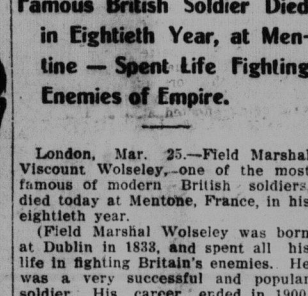
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VISCOUNT WOLSLEY

London, Mar. 25.—Field Marshal Viscount Wolsley, one of the most famous of modern British soldiers, died today at Mentone, France, in his eightieth year.

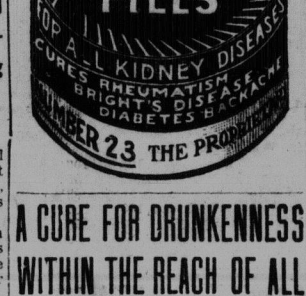
