NOTICE TO MARINERS.

Boston, June 11.—Capt. Colverth, of stmr. Massachusetts, which arrived today from New York, reports that the Gay Head gas buoy and Pollock Rip Blue gas buoy are extinguished; the gas buoy at Nobska Point is burning very dimly. Also that the bell buoy in Pollock Rip Blue has dragged an eighth of a mile northward of its proper position.

DANGERS TO NAVIGATION.

New York, June 13.—Star Harlow (Br) reports June 7, lat 45° 13' N, lon 64° 50' W, passed a spar about 3 feet in diameter projecting from 4 to 20 feet out of water.

Star Killybeg (Br) reports May 28, lat 27° 05' N, lon 64° 57' W, saw a three masted derelict vessel with stumps of masts projecting out of water; June 4, lat 30° 45' N, lon 57° 47' W, saw a large tree.

Star Cairnfort (Br) reports June 3, lat 48° 44' N, lon 49° 18' W, saw a large iceberg and several pieces of ice; lat 48° 25' N, lon 49° 41' W, three large bergs; June 4, lat 47° 40' N, lon 51° 10' W, a large berg, and from 11.45 p. m. to 7.15 a. m. from Cape Ray, to June 6, 2 a. m., passed field ice.

Star Scotia (Br) reports sighted 10 icebergs June 10 in lat 47° 45' N, lon 50° 00' W, and June 11, 2 icebergs in lat 48° 45' N, lon 49° 30' W.

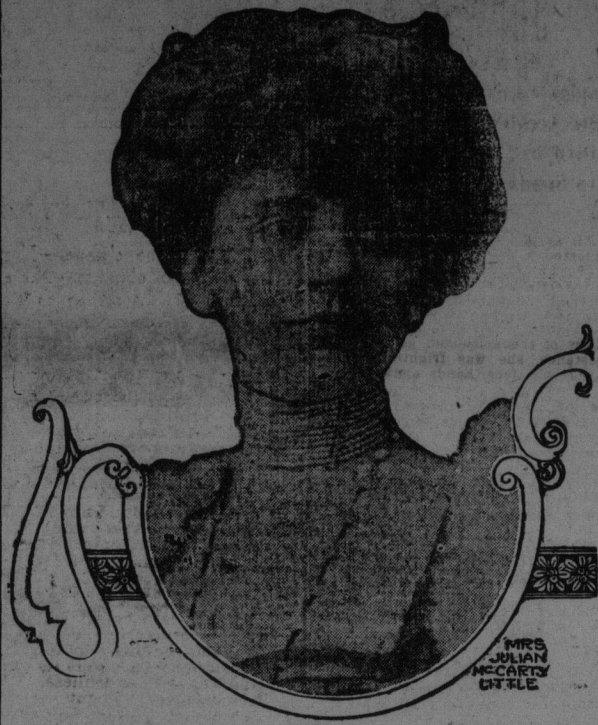

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For a Making Little Headway
Against Rebel
Forces.

GOVT ARMY RECRUITED
FROM THE JAILS

Country Plunged in Anarchy
and Defiance of Rebels
Grows Daily—Peace Far
Off.

Mexico City, June 13.—In the three months General Huerta has been President of Mexico, he has made no substantial headway against the rebels, according to the opinions of close and impartial observers of the situation in this Republic. Unless there is made a radical change in the conduct of the government's campaign against its enemies, or unless the rebels become much weaker than they are today, foreign observers believe that Huerta will have great difficulty in restoring peace to Mexico. As for the rebels, they have grown steadily stronger since General Huerta became President, and now there is scarcely a state in which their mobile columns have not been operating in defiance of the government's superior armament and organization.

"The country is plunged in anarchy," said "El Diario," a pro-government paper, recently. Brigandage holds sway in a large portion of the national territory, defeated in one place, the bands reappear in another, and they carry their audacity to the point of defying the federal divisions in their headquarters. The usual expression in the local papers, however, is of a different character. For the most part they reflect the carefully studied optimistic tone of the officers at the National palace, who make much of the fact that the rebels are not only not making headway, but are actually retreating in many places.

The military operations of the government have been divided into three general campaigns, one in the south against the followers of Zapata, conducted by General Juvenio Robles; another whose center is Guaymas, in Sonora, and the third, directed from Mexico City, against the rebels operating in the states of Coahuila, Nuevo Leon and Tamaulipas. In addition to these three campaigns, the government troops are riding here and there over a dozen states, forcing their way from one point to another, only to find, when they arrive at their destination, that the rebels have cut in behind them, or have torn the country to pieces on either side of their line of march.

In the south Robles promised to exterminate in a few weeks the "bandits" led by Emiliano Zapata. He was instructed by the War Department to use the methods of Weyler in Cuba; to concentrate in a few points all non-combatants, and then devastate with fire and cannon the remaining villages and towns, killing his prisoners, except those of the rebels.

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
