SHOT GRANDMOTHER AND WOUNDED MOTHER

EARTHQUAKE FELT IN OTTAWA AND LONDON

Ottawa, Sept. 30.—The earthquake felt in London, Eng., last night was also recorded at the Dominion Observatory here, the disturbance lasting about two hours. The distance to the epicenter is estimated at 9,000 kilometers, or about 5,600 miles. The disturbance was probably somewhere near Chili. It was stated by observatory officials.

ONLY SLIGHT SHOCK WAS FELT IN CHILE; PEOPLE ALARMED

Panic Ensued on Prediction of Earthquakes, but Fears Proved Unfounded—Many Slept in Tents.

Valparaiso, Chile, Sept. 30.—Panic in consequence of the prediction of earthquakes caused most of the inhabitants to pass last night in tents pitched on the open spaces and in the parks where bands played to cheer them, while troops patrolled the streets. Only a slight shock occurred at midnight but a strong northern wind started at 2 o'clock this morning and created a heavy sea, which increased the fear of the people who were drenched by incessant rains.

Toronto, Sept. 30.—Arthur Richmond, the young killer who stole \$25,000 from the Bank of Toronto and whose attempted suicide led to the discovery of his defalcations, pleaded guilty before Judge Denton today and was sentenced to four years in Kingston. T. C. Robbette, his counsel, said that Richmond had been sentenced to be shot in the gallows but was pardoned to be put in the workhouse for a year. The man's present whereabouts are unknown.

ANNOUNCEMENT ON NAVY IN NOVEMBER

Vancouver, B. C., Sept. 30.—Hon. Martin Burrell, Minister of Agriculture, says of the naval question: "The Dominion Parliament meeting in November, two months earlier than intended, is for the purpose of enabling Premier Borden to make a pronouncement on the navy question, not with the idea of framing a permanent policy, which will be dealt with later and which in due course will be submitted to the people, but for the purpose of presenting the views of the government as formed after the recent conference with the British government and the admiralty."

No appointment has yet been made to the position of secretary of the Board of Trade, and it is probable the appointment will not be made till the annual meeting.
