800 GIRLS ALREADY ENLISTED IN CAMPAIGN FOR FOOD CONSERVATION.
Mr. Fletcher Peacock, director of manual training at the Provincial Normal School, has just returned from a most successful organizing trip through New Brunswick. His object was to interest the girls and women of New Brunswick to join in the forming of eating clubs to conserve the garden produce, says the Fredericton Gleaner.

Although the first Home Efficiency Club among the girls of the province is not yet two weeks old, there are already over forty such clubs in the province. In these about 800 girls have enlisted in a campaign for canning and preserving food materials.

The domestic science teachers, who have volunteered to work among the clubs will assemble at Sackville on July 10th to outline their programme.
