New York, Feb. 21.—Several New  
York papers a few days ago published  
a story quoting a Canadian soldier,  
who had just returned from the front,  
in which it was said that at a boxing  
contest in England at which he was  
present, the names of Freddy Welsh,  
Ted Lewis and Matt Wells were his-  
sored because they had left for America  
during the war and were not in khaki.  
Evidently the English spectators did  
not know all the facts so far as Wells

ter from the English boxer published  
here today and dated from Rochester,

**SCHOONERS IN TROUBLE.**  
Portland, Me., Feb. 21.—British  
schooner Jessie Ashley, bound  
from Boston for St. John, N. B., with  
a general cargo, which has been an-  
chored in the lower harbor for all of  
six weeks waiting for a chance to  
proceed, broke apart from her moor-  
ings about 10 o'clock yesterday fore-  
noon during a heavy squall and drag-  
ged ashore on the outer point of Port  
Gorges Ledge, where she remained  
until about 4 in the afternoon, when she  
was pulled off by the tug Portland,  
which for six hours had remained  
aloftside of her with a hawser at-  
tached, pulling all the time to keep  
her from bumping against the rocks.  
Before going on the ledge the Ashley  
dragged astern of the three-masted  
schooner Isiah K. Stetson, which had  
been lying in the lower harbor for  
nearly three months, the latter losing  
masting and bobstay. The Ashley  
after being floated by the tug was  
taken to a safe anchorage, and al-  
though her bottom is not supposed to  
have received much damage a diver  
will go under her today to ascertain  
what repairs, if any, are needed. She  
received some trifling damage as a re-  
sult of the collision, her toppling lifts  
having parted, letting the mainboom  
down to the rails which were smash-  
ed in two or three places.
