LONDON, July 19. A special to the Daily News this afternoon announces that a large Carlist force has been defeated by the Government troops at Iquidada, in the province of Barcelona, after a battle of eighteen hours, during which the town was frequently taken and lost by the opposing forces. The number of dead and wounded left upon the field was so large that all vehicles of every kind in the town were pressed for their removal.

The French Assembly will probably adjourn on the 27th inst., until November 6th.

The new Spanish Ministry is announced. Great excitement was occasioned in the Cortes yesterday by the explosion of an Orinoli bomb at the door. Who perpetrated the outrage was the object is not known.

It is reported that there have been sixty-two cases of cholera at Vienna, forty-two being fatal.

NEW YORK, July 19. The Brooklyn Trust Company suspended today, causing a temporary depression on Stock Exchange. Mills, the late President, is a defaulter to the extent of \$146,000. Mills drowned himself yesterday.

HOW THE COLLEGE REGATTA WAS RUN—THE ACTUAL WINNERS OF THE RACE CHEATED OUT OF THE HONORS.

(From the Bangor Commercial.)

NEW YORK, July 19. John C. Babcock, umpire of the late regatta at Springfield, publishes the following:

It is proper that the public should be informed of certain facts concerning the late college regatta at Springfield which will explain the confusion that resulted in determining the actual winners.

The score or finishing line instead of being located at right angles with the river bank, as it should have been, was by carelessness or stupidity on the part of those who located it, placed diagonally, the eastern end of the line being one hundred and fifty yards lower down the river than the western end where the judges were requested by the umpire to station themselves. By this arrangement the boats arriving at the eastern end of the line, which was some 2,000 feet long, were a proportionally longer course than those coming on the western shore.

Had the line been located properly at right angles with the course of the boats the result of the race would have been entirely different, and the race decided on the merits of the crews instead of the chance in the position of crossing the line, no two points of which were equally distant from the start.

A diagram showing this blunder on the part of the committee locating the finish will explain the fact that certain boats were actual winners that are obliged to have second places assigned. It is a result to be regretted that a race so superbly conducted by the contestants had such bad management. Without wishing to detract anything from the honor due the victors it is but fair to the other competitors that the facts of the case be publicly and officially announced. In justice to myself I would add that in staking-out of the course or changing the same was wholly with the regatta committee, and not within the province of the umpire who supposed it to be correct. These reports of the eleven judges elected to serve at the regatta will be received in a few days and the positions of the seven boats, not placed, will then be announced.

SPECIAL TO THE NEWS.

Sir Francis Hincks' Denial of McMillen's Charges.

OTTAWA, July 19. The Toronto Mail contains a communication from Sir Francis Hincks, who first deals with the part of the narrative "referring to himself." He admits that he did not remember all that transpired at the interview with Mr. McMillen and his friends in Ottawa in July, 1871. He admits that he was most anxious that negotiations should fall into other hands than those of McMillen & Co. He believes that he requested Sir Hugh to communicate with the Americans, and never gave any address to Sir Hugh; but on his return from New York, he gave Sir Hugh a list of names. He says he has no recollection of any private conversation with McMillen, and cannot believe it possible that he could have discussed with him the views of Sir George E. Cartier. He declares that he never made any authorized communication to Sir Hugh Allan regarding advertising for tenders. He might have acted as a medium of communication, but he cannot recollect what passed at those conversations regarding money transactions. But he says: "I solemnly declare that I never asked and never obtained, either by loan or gift, any sum of money from Sir Hugh Allan or from any other person in connection with the Pacific Railway. I did on one occasion casually say to Sir Hugh Allan that he had been told that he was a capitalist, and he said: 'I know of no employment for my young son, I would be glad if he would hear him in mind.' Sir Hugh replied that when the Pacific Company was formed he would have no difficulty in finding him employment. In conclusion Sir Francis Hincks says: 'I desire to state that the Canadian Government was never in any way a party to any arrangement between Sir Hugh Allan and his American associates.'"
