## TAX ARREARS COM. DOING GOOD WORK

Committee Expect to Have Clean  
Sheet End of Year.

A statement of the amount of taxes outstanding has been prepared by Tax collector Uffelman and it shows that less than \$2400 in taxes are in arrears which on the face of it is most remarkable indeed and it goes to show that the tax arrears committee which is composed of Councillor A. H. Cochrane, Town Clerk J. C. Haight, and tax collector Uffelman have done their work remarkably well. When the above committee took the matter in hand last year the amount outstanding was approximately \$12,500 and while there was some adverse criticism expressed by several citizens at the time as to how they intended to clean up all the arrears still the committee carried their point and when the collector's roll was made up for the year's collection approximately only \$300 was outstanding at the beginning of the year. In conversation with Mr. Cochrane chairman of finance this morning, the Record was informed that of the \$2400 now outstanding practically all of it would be paid before the end of the year as in many instances it simply is a matter of oversight on the part of the party in arrears and when their attention is drawn to the matter the amount will be cleared off. During the year many lots were sold for arrears of taxes and in only one or two cases were the town the losers, and that for trivial amounts. The committee have given considerable time and attention to this above matter and they confidentially expect to have a clean sheet by the end of the year. The arrears have been collected with out any apparent inconvenience to the parties concerned and the town gets a clean sheet it is up to the town fathers who follow to see that it is kept clean from year to year. Waterloo stands in the enviable position of being one of the very few municipalities with very little outstanding taxes.

It is understood the commission have purchased the lots known as the Bechtel Survey lying north of Allan street and as far north as Norman Ave. Fischer street and Essen street will be extended through across Allan street to Norman Ave., and it is in this section which comprises 37 lots that a number of the houses will be built. While the lots are not large they are of ample size to allow of the building of a house on each lot.

### TO VOTE ON INDUSTRIAL BY-LAW

Probably the only by-law to be voted on in January by Goderich citizens will be one to grant exemption of taxes, except school taxes, to the Dominion Road Machine Company for a further period of ten years. The matter was discussed by the Town Council and some of the members were in favor of a fixed assessment, claiming that exemption of a factory is not a good policy and wishing to make a stand for all time to come. A report of the special committee, favoring the company's request, was adopted, however, and the by-law is being prepared. Ten years ago the ratepayers voted what was then known as the American Road Machine Company, tax exemption for ten years, and it is extension of this that the firm asks.
