# Refugees Come Home

Compassion is what Lenzi Aziz hopes to accomplish during the first-ever Refugee Week.

The second-year economics student at the University of New Brunswick is organizing chairman for the week to be held Jan. 18 - 22 on the Fredericton campus. A refugee himself, Mr. Aziz has firsthand experience of the hardships refugees encounter and the problems they face, both overseas and in Canada. This experience, he says, is the reason why he is so motivated to tell the public what it is like to be a refugee.

Refugee Week has two objectives: to help the public understand the problems fac-

ed by the refugee and to generate concern about Bill C-55, which will impose strict restraints on incoming

'In order to erase suspicion toward the refugee, the public must be given accurate information before it can take a stand," says Mr. Aziz. Displays, surveys and public forums will provide the public with that information.

The week will not only provide information, it will also collect it. Members of the public will be surveyed to find out what they feel about refugees. The public attitude surveys are scheduled for Jan. 18 and 19 and will take place both on campus and on the street. William Knight of

UNB's department of mathematics and statistics will compile the results.

Twenty-five local and Ottawa-based organizations will provide displays in the Blue Lounge of the Student Union Building (SUB) from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Wednesday, lan. 20. Additional audiovisual displays may be viewed in Room 103 of the SUB throughout the day. Booths will also be set up in the foyers of several buildings on campus.

The week's events will wind up with two public debates on lan. 21 and 22 at 7:30 p.m. in Room 105, MacLaggan Hall. The Thursday night forum, entitled Refugees: Between a Rock and a Hard Place, will feature two refugees and representatives from UNHCR Ottawa and Amnesty International. In the Friday night forum, spokespersons from the Government of Canada and the Inter-Church Committee for Refugees, as well as professors from UNB will address the topic, Refugees: A Threat or a Contribution?

Mr. Aziz emplhsizes that the debates are not intended for political recruitment or attention. "The main objective is to discuss the pros and cons surrounding the refugee issue."

Born in Sudan, Mr. Aziz first came to Canada as a visitor. When events back home worsened, he became a refugee. He feels "very lucky" that he was accepted into Canada.

Mr. Aziz has a dream to work in a refugee camp some day after graduation. With his experience, he feels he can provide support and guidance to other refugees. Organizing Refugee Week is a partial ulfillment of his dream.
