

all were glad to see them, and read them heartily. Guru left a Tibetan New Testament with a highly educated Tibetan king and queen one day. The next day we were entertained to lunch by this king and queen, and while we were eating, the king very humbly and reverently asked whether it was possible for him to secure a copy of that good book. I presented him with the copy, asking him to begin reading it at the beginning and not cease until the end. Then he will understand the book.

Guru came to a lamasary forty miles inside Tibet and met a lama in charge of a dilapidated lamasary; he had come from Lhasa two years before. He showed him a Tibetan Pentateuch and the Book of Judges, and he wanted both. When he told him that they were 8 anna each, he felt bad, for said he, "I have no pice." Another lama saw a Book of Psalms. He was anxious to have it.

Every Sunday we conducted two meetings, a church service and a Sunday school, just for ourselves, but always Tibetans joined us and sat down. One of the kings, the queen, and daughter came one Sunday and sat through the service.

We returned into India over Darma Pass, a pass over which I had never gone. On it at 5 p.m., in a snowfall, kneeling in the snow, we claimed all the territory we covered for Christ, and prayed that that pass should never be closed to the Gospel again. To that great task we dedicated ourselves. Pray for us, for Bhot, for Tibet, and above all for all the new area that opened to us."

GIRDLING THE WORLD WITH PRAYER.

AFTER the last War, in Eastern Europe there was much bitterness and strong nationalistic feeling, and there were few occasions when it was possible to get the members of different nationalities within the same country to come together, but at the beginning of each year groups gathered in fellowship and prayer under the auspices of the World's Evangelical Alliance, and thus there was unity in prayer with Christians in all parts. Although ties have been severed with Christians in many lands; we look forward hopefully to the time when the bonds of fellowship will again be strong. The Week of Prayer was started nearly one hundred years ago. "In 1846, when the Week of Prayer commenced, Japan was closed; China was only known through its treaty ports; Korea was the hermit-kingdom, sealed against the West. Livingstone, already in Africa, was still looking eagerly northward where the smoke of a thousand villages beckoned him; he had still to make those journeys which were to open the way into the centre of Africa, to bring death to the slave trade, and to establish the Church of Christ in the heart of the continent."

The World's Evangelical Alliance has also been of great service in many lands in upholding the Protestant witness, and it is very important that all such endeavours should receive the deserved support. The appeal by the Alliance in this issue is worthy of special note, and all can be assured that any help given will be well utilised.
