FOLK OF MISSOURI.

One of the most interesting figures in the United States to-day is

Joseph W. Fak, of M. ssouri. This man, when he became State Attorney, dec ded to break up a gang of boodlers who had long been fattening on the public. The offenders were not small fry but men of prominence and standing. His efforts first of all were laughed at and then they were thwarted by every p'ece of ingenuity that craft and money could obtain and his life was even threatened. Still Folk kept on with unabated vigor and courage and in the long run he landed several leading citizens in jail.

At the recent elections Folk ran for Governor. Now Missouri is Republican and Folk is a Democrat, but he swept the State although candidates for other offices, of his political stripe, were snowed under.

People felt that there would be doings when he assumed the gubermaterial chair, and so it has speedily

He made his inaugural address or February 9th and in it he plainly told the Legislators that all the in fluence of his office would be used to stop the barter and the sale of public privileges. He affirmed that it was not enough for each man to be satisfied with his own honesty, but that he must also be jealous for the general probity, and added-

"It is as much your duty to protect and defend the honor of the State as your own honor. It is the highest duty of every legislator and of every citizen to do all that he can to eradicate this evil, which is the greatest danger that confronts the nation to-day." One of the reforms he announced

was a set of rules for the regulation of lobbying - that great United States curse, and a menace which has srept altogether too much into Canada. A week later he brought down the promised restrictions and they were found to be most drastic. The main idea is that the man who visits Legislature with regard to any measure, must first of all report to the Governor on his arrival and explain the object of his visit. In addition, no lobbyist must remain in the place as such, for a longer period than thirty hours. The trusts and the lobbyists in their behalf have viewed the edict with consternation, but they know that Folk is a man of his word and the results have been most marked. "I am pleased," he said recently, "at the manner in which the order has been treated thus far There are now practically no lobbyista here."

This remarkable career of "Hones Joe," as he is most appropriately called; thoroughly demonstrates that with the great mass of the people honesty is the best policy. He has successfully exploded the idea that it is necessary to success in public life on the other side, for the aspirant to stand in with the bosses, and the cliques and the monied men, and the lesson he is thus teaching is one of the most valuable ever inculcated in the Republic. SOUTH AFRICAN RECONSTRUC-TION.

Reconstruction appears to be moving quickly in South Africa. It is reported that a new constitution has been drafted for the two colonies which formerly constituted the Boer republic of the Transvaal and Orange Free State. It is not known whether the new constitution con-cedes the principle of full responsible government or a deliberative assembly with an appointed executive.

CABINET GOSSIP

The statement by Premier Whitney that a change would be made in the portfolio of Attorney-General in a few months, and the fact that a Minister of Mines is to be appointed probably means that several changes will be made. The portfolio or Mines will go to one of the gentlemen now in the Cabinet without portfollo, probably to Hon. M. Hendrie, If the Premier and Mr. Foy were merely to change departments, they would likely have rather taken their permanent places at the start, and it looks to the man on the street as though the present arrangement had made to satisfy one or two of the holders of portfolios who will be given appointments later on, thus opening the way for a general shift, and the bringing in of men who will form the permanent Cabinet.

Buckwheat Batter Always on Hand, Mix well together one quart of buckwheat flour, one teaspoonful of salt, one cupful of rolled oats and one cupful of graham or wheat flour. Scald a cupful of cornmeal with enough boiling water to moisten it. Dissolve onehalf of a yeast cake in a half cupful of warm water. Add to the dry mixture sufficient tepid water (or sweet milk and water mixed) to make a rather thick drop batter. Stir in the scalded meal, dissolved yeast and one or two tablespoonfuls of molasses; then thin slightly with more water or milk and beat thoroughly. Cover and set aside to rise overnight. In the morning thin as much as necessary for baking, using milk or water in which is dissolved a quarter of a tenspoonful of baking soda. Have the griddle very hot. Grease with a thick plece of suet or fat salt pork. Set aside a full half pint of the batter, closely covered, to act as a starter for the next batch in place of yeast. Keep it in a cool place where it will not freeze. svisity in England. Brought from Norway in 1829, this bird within the last thirty years has reared no less than mnety young. Although the eagle owl is reputed to live to a great age, there

is reputed to live to a great age, there appear to be but few recorded instances where the age could be definitely ascertained. A golden eagle which died at Vienna in 1719 was known to have been captured 104 years previously, and a falcon, of what species is not recorded, is said to have attained an age of 162 years. A white headed vulture taken in 1700 died in the zoological gardens at Vienna in 1824, thus living 118 years in captivity.
