RAILWAY COMMITTEE.

The Southwestern Traction Company's Bill.

Toronto, May 21.—The Railway Committee of the Legislature yesterday put through a bill incorporating the Kingston & Frontenac Railway. The road is to run from Kingston to Loughborough Lake and along the northwest shore of the lake, with a branch line from the lake to a point on the Kingston & Pembroke Railway. The road is to be commenced within three years and completed within five years.

The Keewatin & Ontario Railway Company's bill was put over until Friday. The bill is opposed by Mr. Conmee because it conflicts with one that he has in hand.

The Southwestern Traction Company and the Middlesex and Elgin Interurban Railway Companies were given charters last year, and subsequently came to an arrangement to combine forces and run only one road. They came before the committee yesterday with a new bill to obtain a fresh charter. Mr. Dryden, Chairman, said the bill was a very bad one, and the committee adjourned for half an hour, while the interested parties had a discussion. Mr. T. H. Luscombe said that the proposal was for the Southwestern Company to take over the other one, and the new company to be called by the former name. Several interested parties were represented, and objected to the provisions of the bill as granting too wide powers. The City of St. Thomas objected to the company having power to run through St. Thomas and compete with its own street railway.

No satisfactory arrangement could be arrived at. The committee adjourned until this morning.

THE EVIL OF DIVORCE.

Catholics and Protestants May Combine to Fight Its Growth.

New York, May 21.—The Rev. Father Pardow, the well-known Jesuit preacher, in an address before the annual meeting of the Manhattanville Pupils' Association, said that Archbishop Farley had lately been approached by Protestant clergymen, who wish to see a coalition formed with the Roman Catholic Church in the fight against the growing evil of divorce.

FRANK DESERTED.

Indications of Another Fall of Rock.

Blairmore, Alberta, May 21.—R. McConnell and R. W. Brock of the Geological Survey, who have been at Frank for the past ten days, making an investigation of the recent disaster for the Dominion Government, have completed their work by observations made. They ascertained that the most western peak of Turtle Mountain had moved about six inches during the period of their observations. This peak is a massive block of rock, as great in extent as, if not greater than, that which fell from the sky. It directly overhangs the town, and in falling would destroy a part, if not the whole, of what remains of the town. Frank has been reoccupied and business generally resumed during the last nine days, but as a result of the geologists' report Premier Haultain posted a warning yesterday notifying all of the danger to life in remaining, and the town is again depopulated.

Capt. Sullivan Still Missing.

Toronto, May 21.—Captain John Sullivan's tug Snowstorm, on which he is presumed to be travelling about the Georgian Bay, would hardly weather the gale which has been daily raging in the Public Accounts Committee. Yesterday there was still no word of the missing witness, and instructions were given for sending another batch of telegrams to Parry Sound and Depot Harbor. An effort will be made to have Mr. Patrick Shannon here on Friday or on Tuesday next.

TELEGRAPHIC BREVITIES.

Thomas Connell, blacksmith, of Alliston, dropped dead.

The first British Transvaal Parliament was opened at Pretoria.

Independence day was fittingly celebrated throughout Cuba.

Two New York children, overcome by heat, dropped dead on the streets.

Two thousand native houses at Manila were burned down, rendering 8,000 people homeless.

There is an agitation for increased sessional allowance to members of the Legislature.

A London despatch says Lord Strathcona intends to visit Montreal during July and August.

An explosion of firecrackers in Graham's Fair at Galt caused a fire that did about \$500 damage.

A body found in the St. Clair River at Courtwright has been identified as that of Hope Webster of Barrie, missing since last Good Friday.

The Montreal Street Railway men will not strike at present. The Toronto Railway employees had an interview with President McKenzie yesterday, the result of which appears to be satisfactory.

The Canadian Manufacturers' Association are opposed to the bills introduced by Mr. A. W. Puttee, M.P., in the Commons, and by Hon. F. R. Latchford in the Legislature, regarding labor disputes.

Six carloads of stock have just been shipped by the live stock associations to British Columbia. Three carloads of these were stockers, and the balance thoroughbred Shorthorns, Holsteins and Jerseys. The shipment represents about \$5,000 to Ontario farmers.
