CONCLUSION

We have, however imperfectly, completed our undertaking. the brief space at our disposal we have recorded the success of former boys of Dufferin in the Queen City of Canada and have, as far as possible, given a full list of former Dufferinites residing in that populous and progressive centre. We know there may be some to whom we have not done full justice and others who deserved more extended notice, but there has been at least the intention to give a fair and impartial narrative. The success of some of the old boys of Dufferin is bright and inspiring, notaby that of Mr. Long, the record of whose life is like the history of Dick Whittington who went to London a penniless boy and eventually became Lord Mayor of the great metropolis. The little-brochure should surely be an inspiration to others who leave the county in search of fortune, for they will read in it of the successes of Dufferinites before them. We trust that when the next excursion of reunion and rejoicing of old Dufferin boys in Toronto takes place to Orangeville there will be a still larger honor roll of names and that the pamphlet on that occasion recording trials and victories will, warranted by the new circumstances, be more pretentious than the present one. Success undoubtedly awaits every Dufferin old boy who leaves home and is faithfui to the precepts of home, school and church and we cannot end more appropriately than by saying to each of our boys who leaves his own county for other parts:
