Low French Birth Rate. PARIS, April 10.—The birth rate in the French capital for 1912 was the lowest since 1881, according to a municipal report made public to-day. There was only one birth for every thirty families. The infantile death rate was 143 per thousand. Prohibitive rentals are said to have been the chief cause for the decrease in the number of births.

Easter Than Has Been. CHICAGO, April 10.—Faster baseball than has ever been seen is promised for the season of 1913 by President B. B. Johnson of the American League. An attempt will be made this year to see that the games are played in less time than in former years," said Johnson to-day. "The umpires have been instructed

to see that little time is wasted and the managers will co-operate to cut off the minutes which mark the difference between the short snappy game and the one which is long drawn out and which loses much of its charm and interest because of that fact."

Anniversary of Titanic. LONDON, April 10.—Next Tuesday the anniversary of the collision of the Steamer Titanic with an iceberg, will be the date for liners this year to set a still further southerly course than that which was adopted last January. This decision was reached at a recent meeting of transatlantic shipping companies in Brussels, with the understanding that a still further modification of the course is to be made in the event of abnormal ice conditions.

Good Service Rewarded. BOSTON, April 10.—A strike of the telephone operators of Greater Boston, threatened for the past few days, is averted as a compromise reached early to-day after a 48 hours conference between representatives of the company and the union. Instead of increasing wages as was demanded, the company is to adopt a plan of "anniversary payments," of from \$25 to \$100 a year, in the nature of a bonus.

JUDGE USES STRONG TALK

A Jury at Peterboro Receives a Scorching From Justice Latchford

[Canadian Press Despatch]

PETERBORO, Ont., April 10.—Judge Latchford took strong exception to a verdict returned at 12.15 this morning by the jury at the Spring Assizes in which Samuel Steele, of Chatham Township, was found guilty of having had improper relations with his 13-year-old stepdaughter. The jury was out seven hours.

"Where you got your verdict I cannot say or anybody else," commented the judge. Speaking to the prisoner his lordship said: "You are fortunate that I am not trying you. I regret for many reasons that you have not been found guilty."

Judge Latchford in intimating that another charge would be preferred against Steele, remarked that he could assist the law in helping to protect innocent girls from men like the prisoner he would do so. Steele claimed that as his second wife whom he had married ten years ago had since found that her first husband whom she had believed was dead was living in the United States the whole affair was a plot to railroad him to prison. The girl is under the care of physicians and slight hopes are held out for her recovery as she now suffers from heart trouble.

CALGARY, April 10.—There will be no postponement of the Alberta election, Justice Walsh handed down his decision yesterday dismissing the application of the Conservatives for an injunction restraining the returning officer from proceeding. The application was dismissed on the objection raised by James Short, K.C. Liberals' counsel, who contended that the matter was one over which the court had no jurisdiction. If this view the court acquiesced. The decision was given earlier than was expected.

Calgary's Record

CALGARY, Alb., April 10.—Calgary yesterday set a new Western Canada cattle sale record for the season when an average price of \$368.35 per head was obtained for sixty seven head disposed of. In 1912 the grand average per head was \$113 and in 1911 only \$98. The highest price paid for cattle of any one breed was an average of \$368 for twelve herefords. Numerically short-horns were in the lead, forty nine head bringing an average of \$302 per head. Two Aberdeen Angus averaged \$182, two Galloways \$115.
