WRECKED AUTOMOBILE IN WHICH PROMINENT MEN WERE KILLED.



S. Osgood Pell, the well known financier and sporting man, and William Laimbeer were killed when the automobile they were riding in was crushed into a railroad train. The above photograph, taken a few minutes after the fatal accident, shows how completely the automobile was demolished by the impact of the collision with a fast speeding Long Island Railroad train. The shattered bulk of the heavy limousine car... 350 feet from where the thirteen car electric train struck it. Mr. Pell's body was taken from where it was wedged in the tangle of wreckage. The others were flung clear of it. Parts of the automobile were scattered more than two hundred feet along the track.

HOW ALEXANDER MELVILLE BELL GOT FIRST CASH

(Continued from Page 1) grew which is featured in the New York Evening Mail, with a photograph of Prof. Alexander Graham Bell.

"In the early summer of 1877 I was a passenger bound for Ottawa on a steamboat from Montreal. A fellow passenger, robustly built, with a venerable looking beard and whiskers slightly tinged gray, seated himself beside me and engaged the writer in conversation. The stranger suddenly remarked, 'You're a Scotchman.'"

"His mission to Ottawa was in the interests of his son, Alexander Graham Bell, who had invented the telephone. He was Prof. Alexander Melville Bell, elocutionist, educator and scientific author on the voice. He described the telephone, and inquired whether the writer would recommend a suitable person in Ottawa to look after his son's interests at the capital, and more especially watch against infringements being registered in the Patent office. The writer was then in the employ of the Dominion Government, being in charge of the law branch of the department of marine and fisheries, and he agreed to act for Prof. Bell.

"Upon arriving in Ottawa Prof. Melville Bell was introduced to some of the higher officials and also to the newspaper offices. The telephone had been invented by his son in Edinburgh some years previously, and the younger Bell had devoted his inheritance had brought on illness. This and the loss by death of a brother of the inventor were the chief contributing causes of the family emigrating to Canada, where they settled at Tutela Heights, three miles from Brantford, Ont. There was laid in a crude way the first experimental telephone line between the city of Brantford and the Tutela Heights residence. About April 1, 1877, another such experimental line this time between Boston and Somerville, Mass., was laid by a Mr. Chas. Reis, an electrician, between his office and dwelling house.

At the time of Professor Melville Bell's visit to Ottawa, no legislation existed to enable telephone lines to be laid, and the Western Union Telegraph Company stubbornly refused to accommodate the new invention. Overtures made to the government induced them to lay a line between the official residence at Rideau Hall of the Earl of Dufferin, as Governor-General of Canada and the office of the Hon. Alexander Mackenzie, the prime minister, two miles apart. That distinguished personages that the telephone might be discontinued, Lord Dufferin promptly countermanded the order and thus probably saved to the world at large the greatest invention of the nineteenth century, an invention which has revolutionized human intercourse—commercial and social.
