

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST LAND REGULATIONS.

City Passenger and Ticket Agent. Phone #6 THE sole head of a family, or any mal over 18 years old, may homestead a uarter-section of available Dominion land Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta, Ap

cant must appear in person at the L on Lands Agency or Sub-Agency fo be District. Entry by proxy may be made t any Dominion Lands Agency (but not ab Agency), on certain conditions. Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in

Duties—Six months' residence in each of three years after earning homestead pat-ent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions A settler who has exhausted his home. A settler who has exhausted his home-stead right may take a purchased home-stead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties--Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300. The area of cultivation is subject to re-duction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land.
