The play is very efficient cast, and this Mr. Brown promises. It will consist of actors with thorough training in English methods. 

REV. MR. JEAKS DELIGHTFUL "BRANT"

Chaplain of the 5 Many Inspiring Incidents—Ear up Comforts For

Victoria Hall was crowded to doors last night when Capt. Jeak, rector of St. Jude's Church, went to the front as Chaplain of 58th Battalion, gave an address "Brantford to Ypres."

Mr. W. F. Cockshutt, M.P., occupied the chair in a very happy manner and in a stirring opening address, briefly drew upon some phases of the war. He spoke of Mr. Jeak as a minister who is a militant not alone in the cause of the Master, but also on behalf of the Empire. He had already done some good and had signified his desire to go back and do more. All class citizens were deservedly proud of the rev. gentleman.

Rev. Mr. Jeak's long sustained applause, spoke without notes and his address was not in any sense of the conventional lecture type. It partook of the conversational tone and throughout, most entertainingly delightful.

The speaker first of all referred to the experiences of anyone going to the front as wonderful and beyond the power of tongue to adequately portray. All Canada should feel a thrill of pride in their men folk were accomplished for the cause of Empire, righteousness and God. The 58th Battalion had arrived at Plymouth on Dec. 28th and on the 30th had departed on the 29th for France. The order to land had been slated for 3 o'clock in the morning. It was characteristic of the military power that there was no time limit, men marched, night or got up at unearthly hours just as they were told. They landed at a British port on the coast—he could not give the name. Then at dawn they were split up in packet boats to cross the channel which was very stormy. One could have accumulated all the battalions, but they were split up that in the case of submarine, other disaster, the whole regiment would not perish. He ventured opinion that 99 per cent. of officers and men were very ill, and they were bitterly cold as there were fires, or any other heat. He tried to rest on the top deck, two waves dashing over him to a change of mind.

landings at Havre they were to march three miles to billets, weather was raw, and the road and towards the end of the route snow storm was encountered on the east. On arrival they saw tents, in that the front were matters of a joke and a smile, and boys said to each other, "Well would come!"
