### COUNTIES COUNCIL NOTES

The election of Mr. I. C. Alguire to the office of warden was very popular with the members. Mr. Britton congratulated Mr. Alguire upon his elevation to the wardenship. He stated that during his connection with the council he found the new warden peculiarly fitted for the new duties to which he had been called, and coming as he did from a worthy line of ancestors, the honor conferred on Mr. Alguire was no more than he deserved.

Miles H. Young of Forfar and David Lynch of Wolford were appointed auditors at a salary of \$130 each. At Wednesday's session, the retiring warden Mr. E. M. Bracken was presented with a solid gold Masonic ring by his fellow members.

The House of Industry committee for this year are Messrs. Bowser and Baker. Mr. Fred Scovil was re-elected to the office of trustee of the A.H.S. As usual, the question of abolishing tollgates was left in abeyance. The committee is to ascertain how much of the \$22,500 Brockville will contribute.

The General Hospital was given a grant of \$550 and St. Vincent De Paul a grant of \$450. The General Hospital also received a special grant of \$300 on account of the large number of non-paying patients being cared for at that institution.

It was decided that the clerk be instructed to draft a by-law to be passed at the June session exempting these counties from the operation of the Ontario Act relative to wider sleighs.

Mr. Bissel raised a strong objection to the three lunatics at present in the House of Industry. One of these was a raving maniac fit for any asylum, while another was an idiot and should be transferred at once to Orillia.

### Local Option Wave

That local option prohibition of liquor selling has a large hold in Ontario is shown by 289 Ontario municipalities being free from bar-rooms. These include one hundred municipalities where the abolition is the result of a vote, in ninety-six of them on local option and in four on the Dunkin act. The remaining 139 are without licenses for various reasons, such as the failure of applicants to secure enough signatures, too high license fees, overwhelming temperance sentiment, or the refusal of the commissioners to grant licenses. Contests are proceeding in five more municipalities, in each of which there was a large majority for liquor at the referendum vote in 1902.

### ELECTRIFICATION OF ST. CLAIR TUNNEL

The announcement has been given out by the Grand Trunk Railway System that arrangements have been made for the adoption of electric traction in the St. Clair Tunnel, the contract for which has been awarded to the Westinghouse Electric and Manufacturing Company; the work to be started at once and brought to completion as quickly as possible. The system that will be adopted is known as the alternating current system with overhead conductors—the conductors in the interior of the tunnel being placed upon the walls, and in the railway yards they will be supported by steel bridges. The trains will be operated by alternating current locomotives, capable of hauling a passenger train on the grade at the rate of 20 to 25 miles an hour, and a freight train of 1000 tons at the rate of ten miles an hour. The interior of the tunnel and the yards on both the United States and Canada sides of St. Clair River will be lighted by electricity from the power that will be generated in the extensive power house that will be necessary to erect. The length of the tunnel proper is 6,025 feet and of the open portals or

approaches, 5,603 feet additional, or more than two miles in all, one of the longest sub-marine tunnels in the world. It is a continuous iron tube, nineteen feet, ten inches in diameter, put together in sections as the work of boring proceeded, and finally bolted together the total weight of the iron aggregating 56,000,000 pounds.

The work was commenced in September, 1888, and it was opened for freight traffic in October 1891; a little more than three years being required for its completion. Passenger trains began running through it December 7, 1891.

It cost \$2,700,000.

### Inspection of Cheese Factories.

The Eastern Ontario Dairyman's Association, when in convention at Peterboro, passed a resolution, requesting the Ontario Government to pass such legislation as may be required to insure the sanitary inspection of all cheese factories and creameries in the Province. The matter of inspection was dealt with by the Western Association in convention, but it was referred to a committee, which meets the latter part of this month. It is expected that the two associations will form a joint committee and present a petition for sanitary inspection to the Minister of Agriculture. If this is done it will have to be decided whether the work of inspection should come under the supervision of the Board of Health or the Department of Agriculture, and also whether factory inspectors shall also be inspectors, or whether the two branches shall be separated.
