WILL STAND BY MR. TARTE

of trade, a Life-Long Liberal, Commends Policy.

Says That a Great Mistake has Been Made in Retiring him From Cabinet.

John Piggoit, president of the Chatham Board of Trade, and a lifeong and active Liberal worker, speaking of the Hon. Israel Tarte this morning, said :-

"It may have been a breach of eti-quette for Mr. Tarte to wander away from his colleagues in the cabinet, still from the Canadian standpoint, I think Mr. Tarte is on the right track. I believe in both reciprocity and protection to this extent that I think it is only right for Canada to have an equal tariff with her neighbor and that she should have the same privilege with the United States that the United States has

"As for Tarte's policy being alto-gether in favor of the manufacturers, that is all nonsense. It's beneficial effect will be felt just as much by the farmers, mechanics, and every other class of the population as it will be felt by the manufacturers.

'I am fully in accord with Mr. Tarte's transportation and tariff, scheme. That scheme if carried out, will be a great factor in the future prosperity and success of this country.
"There are other reasons why I endorse Tarte. The last census showed that Canada had not increased in population as had been expected, or as she should have done. The reason is this. A young man starting in life looks around for the best fields to eek his livelihood in. He goes to the United States where there is a much larger market, and where they also have the added advantage of eaching our market-a privilege we don't enjoy in regard to the market of the United States, Consequently a large number of our sons and daughters are in the United States en-gaged in manufacturing articles which are sold in Canada.. We want those young men and women to manufacture those articles in Canada and why shouldn't they find as profitable employmment at home as in a foreign country, that we import so largely from?

"Looking at this matter wholly from the Canadian standpoint, if we don't look after ourselves, Uncle Sam is cute enough to realize that he doesn't want reciprocity so long as he has much the best of it, in commercial

"I can only say that, so far as I am concerned, I am in hearty accord with Mr. Tarte, and believe a great mistake has been made in his retirement from the Liberal cabinet."

Irish Jack, the local "master of the the administration" says that Tarte is a fool, that he is clever enough, but lacks ballast. Had the Hon. Mr. Tarte resigned first and talked afterwards he would have carried much more weight. Instead, however, as a paid minister of the government he chased around the country in the absence of his leader, in the government's private car and aired his own views. Tarte got just what he had to expect. The Conservatives don't wan't him, the Liberals don't want him, and he will now be forced to

HASTY AND ILL-ADVISED !

President of Chatham's Board City Council's Action so Characterized by Local Wood Dealer.

> It is Responsible for Increase in the Price of Wood to City Householders.

Angus Crow, one of the Maple City's oal and wood dealers, in an intersituation this morning, said,-

"The action of the City Council in dvertising for wood has sent that fuel sky high in price, so high, in fact, that the dealers cannot touch

"In the spring I bought some '18nch wood about 14 miles out in the country right in the bush at 85 cents a cord and went out a few days ago to a place not a stone's throw away from it expecting to get some more

"There was more there but the owners now wanted \$2 a cord for it. That is the wood that we deliver in the city here for \$2.50 a cord. order to make anything out of it at \$2 a cord we would have to sell it at \$3.50 or \$3.75, after paying for nauling it out of the bush, carting it to the cars, paying the freight on it, drawing it from the station to the wood yard and then delivering

it around town. "There is no doubt that the coal famine has had some tendency to the advance of wood, but the advertising for it by the Council is the material

"Besides this the city is taking the good trade and leaving the bad to the dealers. Those that can pay spot eash will buy from the town, while those who cannot pay all at once are left to us.

"I think the local dealers could have supplied the demand for the winter all right, as wood is quite plentiful in the country and at more reasonable prices than it will now be supplied

"The fact that the householders will be called on to pay increased prices for wood this winter must be attributed to the hasty and ill-advised action of the Council in creating a scare and accordingly running up the
