MURIEL FOSTER IN LONDON.

Miss Muriel Foster, having attained to the proud position of the leading contralto of the day in Europe, now cherishes an ambition to win her laurels in America as well, and on Tuesday evening she gave a farewell concert at St. James' Hall prior to starting on her tour. She certainly had plenty of evidence of her popularity, for the hall was filled with a most enthusiastic audience. Miss Foster is an artist of very unusual gifts. She has a superb voice, which she uses admirably, and her singing is always that of a thorough artist. She is at her best in songs that require great breadth and treatment, such, for example, as Beethoven's "Mortals, Trust Us, Wanders Meer," with which she headed the program, and which was superbly sung. But her performance of arias always marked by rare intelligence, and whether she was singing this or Brahms' "O wasser ich dich den Weg zuruck" or "Meine Liebe ist mein," or Rachmaninoff's "Valse lente," or Bizet's "Berguesse," she invariably showed that she is blessed with an unusual amount of temperament. She has the assistance of Jean Gerardy, who played Bosman's "Variations Symphoniques" and other violin solo with as perfect art as ever. Cabled to the New York Musical Courier.

CLOSING OF A GOOD YEAR

Third Annual Banquet of the Harwich Literary and Debating Society

Delightful Function at the Home of Mr. Everett—An Excellent Toast List—A Successful Season

The third annual banquet of the Literary and Debating Society of No. 1, Harwich, was held on Thursday evening last at the residence of Mr. W. W. Everett. About fifty covers were laid and the repast was a sumptuous one, reflecting great credit on the executive and the young ladies of the section. The large dining room was prettily decorated for the occasion, Union Jacks being most conspicuous in the display. The tables, too, looked very dainty, plants of various kinds interspersed with fresh flowers delighting the eye everywhere. The menu was on a liberal scale and for some time all went merrily as a marriage feast. Then glasses were filled with delicious home-made wine and the chairman, Mr. W. W. Everett, and the vice-chairman, Mr. M. J. Willson, announced the toasts in the manner of past masters.

The first toast, "The King," having been duly honored in the usual way, Mr. A. Cameron was called upon to respond to that of "Canada and the Empire," which he did in a way that showed the high place both occupied in the hearts of the people of No. 1, Harwich. Mr. Lindsay Parrott, president of the Society, in replying to the toast of "Our Society," gave an interesting sketch of its history and thanked the members one and all for their patriotic support during the year. Mr. A. R. Everett also made an able speech in which he thanked the trustees of the section for their co-operation in the work of the Society. The dramatic feast brought forth from Mr. John McGeachy an interesting account of the several successful attempts of the Society in the dramatic art. The toast to "No. 1 Section" was drunk in a very hearty manner and called forth patriotic and humorous speeches from Alex. Everett and Will McGeachy.

The second part of the program opened with the toast "Forty years ago," and was honored by Mr. A. R. Everett, Mr. M. J. Smith, Mr. A. McGeachy, Andrew Everett and A. E. Field. A funny description of a shiny match between the residents of No. 1 and No. 2, in which Magistrate Houston acted as referee, sent the audience into fits of laughter, partly at the expense of No. 2. Good practical speeches by Messrs. M. J. Smith and H. English were given in response to the toast of "Rural Advancement," and showed that the debaters of No. 1 were fully abreast of such modern requirements as telephones, rural mail delivery, wireless telegraphy and paved roads.

Mr. Harry Collins, of the C. I. T. staff, replied on behalf of the staff of the Club to "Sister Societies." He was glad to be able to assure the Society of the good feeling and interest that the Club of which he is president had for the Harwich Literary and Debating Society, and congratulated the members on their enterprise in carrying on so successfully the good work, expressing a wish that such societies might be more general throughout the county. The banquet closed with the toast "Harwich."
