

Nashville, Tenn., Oct. 23—President Roosevelt was heartily welcomed here yesterday, the city being beautifully decorated and there being thousands of visitors from neighboring cities. The President addressed a great crowd in the railwaymen's auditorium, saying among other things:

"There has been trouble in the stock market in the high financial world during the past few months. The statement has frequently been made that the policies for which I stand, legislative and executive, are responsible for that trouble. Now, gentlemen, these policies of mine can be summed up in one brief sentence. They represent the effort to punish successful dishonesty. I doubt if these policies have had any material effect in bringing about the present trouble, but if they have, it will not alter in the slightest degree my determination that for the remaining sixteen months of my term these policies shall be persevered in unswervingly."

OPENING OF PARLIAMENT.

Despatch From Ottawa Threws Doubt on Date Named.

Ottawa, Oct. 23.—The date of the opening of Parliament has not yet been definitely fixed, though it is generally agreed that Nov. 28, as already announced, will probably be the opening of the House. There is some talk of not meeting until next year, and such a contingency is by no means remote.

So far the indications are that private legislation will not be heavy, but there is yet pienty of time for an accumulation of applications, as promoters have until the first six weeks of the session to file their bills without penalty.

Applications for 46 private bills have been received. Most of these are for amendment to existing legislation, though there are five applications for the incorporation of new railway companies, all in Alberta and Saskatchewan.

Seven applications for divorce have been made, of which three are from Toronto.
