Spring Millinery Comes to Wolfville.

It is an interesting fact that this year's continued mild weather is permitting us to don straw hats days and days earlier than usual.

Such a variety of shapes and sizes from the simple, but season-season hat down to the flimsiest of summer-straw and lace, there are several hats of the same shape to be seen.

Some of the new spring hats are so small and high crowned, and so proximate to straw the French can a shanter that has been so popular in velvet and fur for two seasons.

The poke bonnet, turbans galore and many other modes abound. Technically talking the newest mode is the 'Wattie', the 'Alcove' and the 'Napoleon'. More trimming than usual will be found on hats this year, not that trimming will be out but that it will be used in abundance. The rough straw hats suitable for spring wear will, of course, bear ribbons or fruit trimming, though on some will be found leather ornaments.

The newest in these is the slender whip shape, others with tiny bundles of jet. The smartest colors are victory red and navy and jet in blue and the lovely shadew brown known as 'beige'.

Many lovely new hats in all the prevailing modes and shades are shown at W. C. Dexter & Co's. The new straw hats are in many occupying and fashionable modes for both men and women in Miss Saxton's store. A pretty visor shaped hat shown here has an entire top and facings of victory red combined with navy blue, red and black and threaded with narrow red satin ribbon.
