WEEKLY NEWSPAPER MEN

Hold Successful Convention at Halifax—Much Pleased With Trip Through Annapolis Valley

The fourth annual convention of the Canadian Weekly Newspaper Association, held at Halifax on Monday and Tuesday was a most interesting and successful gathering. Delegates were in attendance from all over Canada, from Vancouver Island to Nova Scotia, and one from Newfoundland. The discussions at the meetings were most helpful and the citizens of Halifax entertained the delegates in a royal manner.

About 175 delegates left Toronto by special C. P. R. train on Thursday of last week and arrived at Fredericton Friday afternoon, where they were tendered a reception by the civic authorities. Saturday was spent at St. John and on Sunday morning the steamship "Empress" made a special trip to bring the party to Digby, where they were given a motor drive. Leaving Digby by special train they made a short stop at Annapolis Royal and arrived at Kentville about five o'clock. The Boards of Trade of Kentville and Wolfville had about fifty cars ready, and after a selection by the Kentville band the party were taken for a motor drive to the Experimental Station and through Wolfville to Grand Pre. The writer, who joined the party at Kentville, heard many expressions of delight concerning the drive during the remainder of the journey to Halifax.
