SPLENDID SPORT AT FAIR GROUND TOMORROW

Twenty Four Events are on the Card—Amateurs in Open Events Must be Registered

Dominion Day sports at the Exhibition grounds promise to be a record breaker this year. Under the auspices of the local lodges, S. O. E., and I. O. O. F., M. U., a huge outing is provided for the citizens of Brandon. A list of twenty-four events will be completed for.

A grand parade will proceed to the grounds at 1.30 headed by the City Band. The band will also provide music during the afternoon and evening.

Entries for all the races will be received until ten minutes before each event takes place.

The Grand Parade

The grand parade will start from the Central Fire Hall at 1.30 p.m. Members of the different lodges will meet at the Fraternal Hall at 1 o'clock, after which they will march down to Princess avenue and join the fire brigade at 1.30 p.m. From here, the whole parade will proceed north to Rosser avenue, west to Tenth street, south to Victoria avenue, west to Thirteenth street and south to Exhibition grounds.

The admission for adults is 25c and for children 10c.

St. Marys Bat First

St. Marys were first to bat and sent in Cabellu and Clark to face the bowling of Stordy and Ray, the former bowler opening at the south end. Three runs had only been scored when Clark was clean bowled out by Stordy. Barr then joined Cabellu but he did not last long being bowled by Ray for a duck. Shilton was the next man in and after having only scored one was given out on an appeal for leg-before-wicket. Three for thirteen. 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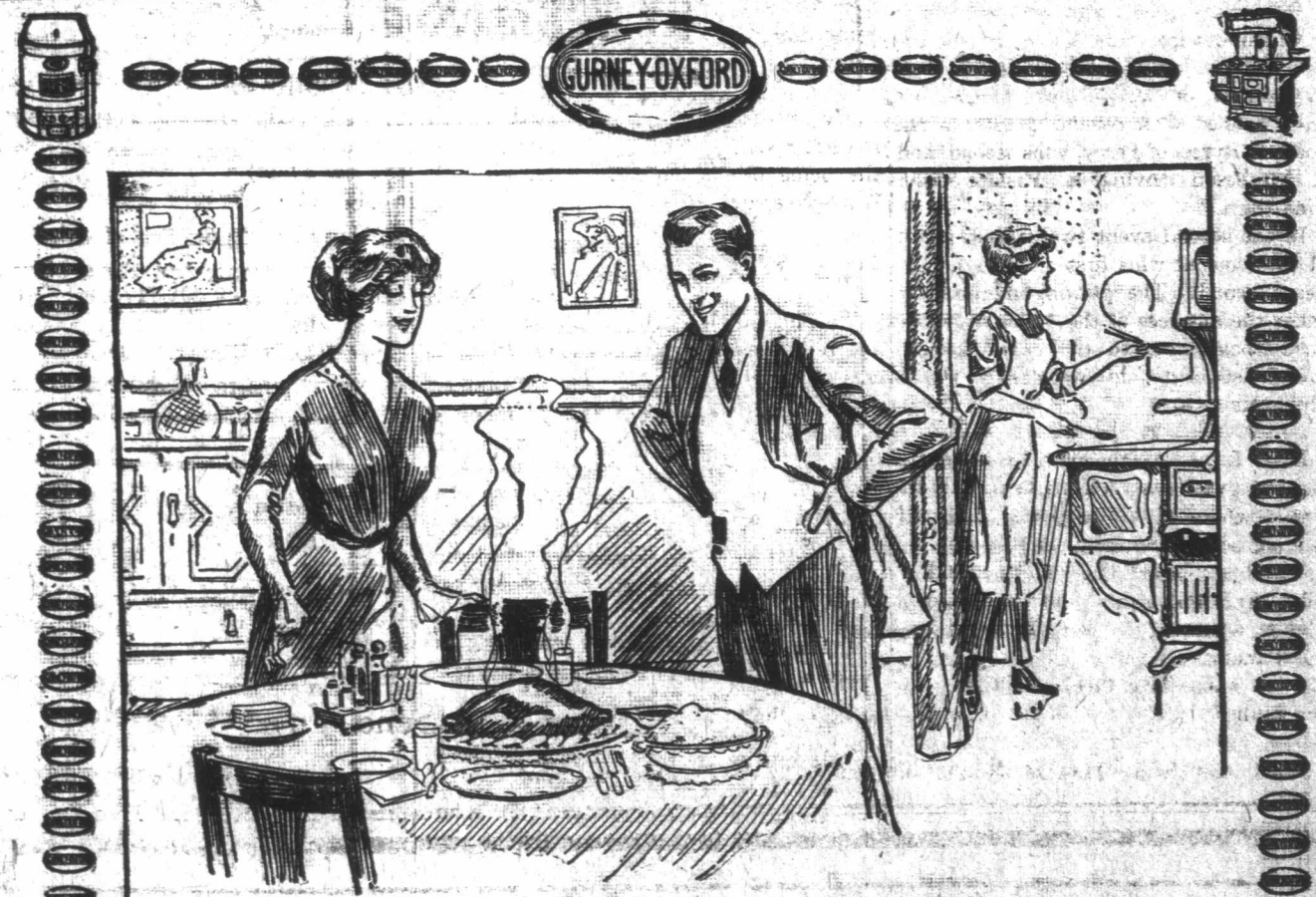
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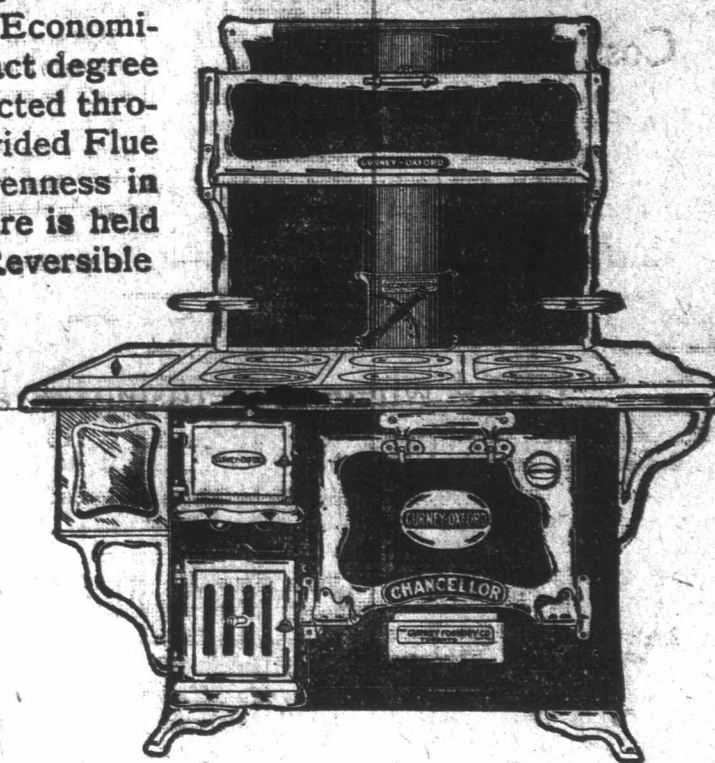
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
