Costing More to Raise Spuds

A shift must come in Aroostook farming during the next few years. We are informed that the new prices on fertilizer will be something like these—\$56 a ton for no-potash fertilizer and \$74 for four-per-cent potash fertilizer. With these prices, for ordinary yields, with the prices of farm help that must be paid in Aroostook and also other expenses in the future that will doubtless prevail for years, is the farmer going to be able to get off safely all the time with potatoes raised on such fertilizer? We doubt it very much. The farmers have got to get used to keeping at least a small amount of live stock, so he can raise potatoes well on part of his ground without buying so much high-priced fertilizer, which may not be nearly so good as it ought to be.—Fort Fairfield Review.

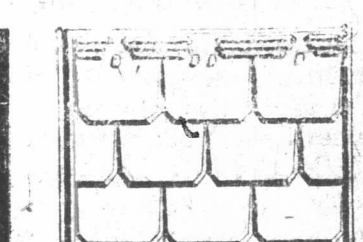
