"I should never have made any success in life if I had been shy of taking pains, or if I had not bestowed upon the least thing I have ever undertaken, exactly the same attention and care that I have bestowed upon the greatest. Do everything at your best. It was but last year that I set to and learned every word of my Readings, and from ten years ago till last night I have never read to an audience but I have watched for an opportunity of striking out or inserting somewhere. Look at such of my manuscripts as are in the library at Gads' and think of the patient hours devoted to their preparation. I have never been in a hurry. The weather is very severe here, and the work is very hard. Deby (his manager) having been violently pitched into by the mayor of New Haven (a town at which I am to read next week) has gone off boldly this morning with defiant, written instructions from me to inform the said mayor that if he fails to make out his case he (Deby) has to return all the money taken, and to tell him that I will not set foot in his jurisdiction, whereupon the New Haven people will probably fall upon the mayor in his turn and lead him a pleasant life."

PARLIAMENT

The call of Parliament to meet on February 20th puts a stop to all speculation about the possibility of a general election. There can now be no dissolution at least until a parliamentary discussion has shown what Parliament itself wants. There is much important war and after-the-war business yet requiring attention, and if the politicians would forget about politics and think only of the solution of those problems, the union government would do the work in hand far more satisfactorily than can any party administration. Hon. J. A. Calder, in an address before the Canadian Club at Toronto, a few days ago, not only denied that early election was contemplated, but declared there would be no appeal to the electorate until all our men are home from overseas. The plain meaning of that statement is that the government has accepted the mandate of a year ago as an expression of the public desire that union government should deal not only with the war itself, but also with the problems arising out of the war. Although recent happenings have given unmistakable indications that some former supporters of union government, Conservative as well as Liberal, do not support this view, it probably is the view entertained by a great majority of those elected as unionist, and will continue to hold them together at least until some very clear-cut party issue forces a cleavage on distinct lines of thought. The tariff is the issue generally expected to cause a parliamentary split. It is plain that both free trade and protectionist forces are preparing for a great struggle on that issue, perhaps during the coming parliamentary session, precipitating the break-up which eventually must come. In any event, the activities of Sir Wilfrid Laurier on the one hand, and of Hon. Robert Rogers on the other tend to prepare the public mind for a very lively and interesting parliamentary session.—St. John Globe.
