CHEERED THE ASSASSIN.

A Wild Scene at a Meeting of Socialists Held
at Chicago.

CZOLGOSZ HELD UP FOR ADMIRATION.

CHICAGO, Dec. 6.—President McKin-
ley's assassin was cheered publicly in
Chicago last night. Abraham Isaak,
the leader of the Reds in this city, and
others of the Free Society, declared
openly he could not condemn
the assassin's act. He said
that as to personal merit, he took a
second place to Czolgosz. The confes-
sion of Isaak was accompanied by a
scene of intense excitement. It
was the climax of the debate on

socialism and anarchy, and when the
audience of over 1,000 had been aroused
thoroughly by the wild oratorical de-
clamations.

"Hurrah for Czolgosz," shouted a
man in the gallery, swinging his hat
above his head. Hisses, jeers, yells
of applause and cat calls
came from all parts of the house.
The crowd rose to its feet and a riot
was only averted by the prompt action
of the chairman.

HOLINESS MOVEMENT.

Rev. Mr. Johnston Leaving for Iceland to
Spread the Doctrine.

OTTAWA, Dec. 6.—Rev. S. D. John-
ston, Hornerite, is going to Iceland in
the interests of the Hornerite Holiness
movement. He leaves by the
Ionian from St. John tomorrow for
Glasgow, and thence continues his
journey to the north. Mr. Johnston
came to Canada a few years ago and
became converted at a holiness meet-
ing and subsequently was admitted to
the ministry. He proved a hard
worker and now his ambition is to
convert his fellow countrymen, the
Icelanders.

Mark All Your Baggage.

"Mark all your baggage," that is
the injunction to every man in any
way connected with the baggage de-
partment of all railroads. It means
so little to the passenger, and yet
its fulfillment would relieve much
care on the part of the little army
of men who toil hard from one end
of the day to the other, and in hun-
dreds of instances assist very materi-
ally in facilitating matters when it
comes to making close connections
as is often the case in these days of
railroading.

A man who has made the handling
of baggage a study, says:
"Why is it so many people do not
have some initial, name, or other
identifying mark on their trunks and
valises? Simply because they have
the greatest of faith in the railway
baggage men. That is a compliment,
but if they had any idea how greatly
this would assist us in preventing
baggage from going astray they
might all possibly be induced to have
some mark on their baggage."

Telescopes, dress suit cases, and
trunks in these days nearly all look
alike to the baggage clerks and hand-
lers, and, it may be said, also to the
owners. Hundreds of instances could
be cited of where two and often as
many as five persons claimed the
same piece of baggage before the
checks were put on. This generally
results in a searching through the
boxes, which is an annoying proce-
dure to the men as well as to the pas-
senger. My advice is: "Mark your
baggage."

Parsnips in Winter.

To a woman without a cellar, a
good supply of vegetables that may
be left in the garden all winter and
drawn upon as needed is a boon.
Among this class of roots, the par-
snip is perhaps the most satisfactory
for general use. Its flavor is im-
proved by the action of the frost,
and is therefore at its best when a
succulent, nutritious vegetable is
most relished and usually highest
priced in the market.

Parsnips are a fine seasoning for
soups. To one quart of soup stock
allow one well cleaned parsnip cut
into slices, lay several slices on one
another, and cut into small narrow
strips; add to the stock and simmer
until tender, and serve without
straining. A spoonful of Chili
sauce blends nicely with the flavor
of the parsnips, as do also chopped
parsley and onion.

To make delicious parsnip fritters
boil four or five parsnips till tender,
remove the skins and mash them very
fine. Add to them a teaspoonful of
flour, one well beaten egg and salt to
taste. Make the mixture into small
cakes with a spoon and fry on both
sides to a delicate brown in sizzling
hot butter or beef drippings. When
done serve them on a napkin. Pars-
nips are often browned under roast
beef and served in a separate dish
with the exception of a few pieces
which are left to garnish the meat.
Wash and scrap the parsnips, and if
very large cut them across. Put
them into boiling salted water and
cook quickly until tender. Drain and
place them in the dripping pan un-
der roast beef, and when the meat
has been removed, dust over them a
little pepper and salt and let them
brown nicely.
