

OBITUARY.

Mrs. John Hardie. Newcastle, N. B., Oct. 17.—Word has been received here of the death of Mrs. John Hardie, in Ottawa, after a short illness. She was formerly Miss M. Mitchell, of Newcastle, and was in her seventy-ninth year. She was a sister of the late Hon. Peter Mitchell, also of Miss Jane Mitchell, of Newcastle, who is the only surviving member of the family. The death of Mrs. Michael Oldfield occurred at Carleton on Wednesday, at the age of 73 years. She was formerly Miss Mary Johnston, of Redbank. Death was due to Bright's disease. She leaves three sons and three daughters.

SHOT WHILE HUNTING.

Halifax, Oct. 17.—Caleb Dauphinee, aged 22, was seriously and probably fatally injured while hunting moose in the woods at Tantallon, St. Margaret's Bay, today. He was sitting with a companion when the latter's gun was accidentally discharged, the bullet entering Dauphinee's side above the hip. The men were back two miles in the woods. The companion hastened for assistance and a party with a stretcher went in and brought Dauphinee out, there being no other means of conveyance. He was brought to the hospital here on an express wagon. At midnight the injured man's condition was critical.

The Charges Not True, Says Mrs. Mackay in Formal Answer

Alleges That Mrs. Blake Threatened to Kill Her Own Husband—Issue Now Joined in Alienation Suit—Noted Surgeon Remains in Secclusion—Date for Hearing Has Not Been Set.

New York, Oct. 17.—Denying specifically every charge made against her by Mrs. Catherine A. Blake, wife of Dr. Joseph A. Blake, in her action to recover \$1,000,000 damages for alleged alienation of Dr. Blake's affections, Mrs. Katherine A. D. Mackay yesterday filed her answer to Mrs. Blake's charges in the Supreme Court. Mrs. Blake said she was married to Dr. Blake on December 17, 1890, and that until four years ago she lived happily with him. About that time, she alleges, Mrs. Mackay, "well knowing the promises and promises being tending to injure the plaintiff, and to deprive her of her husband's affection, support, protection, society and comfort, four years ago and thereafter maliciously gained and kept, and still keeps this affection by wicked and wrongful arts, abasements, flatteries and seductions."

To all this Mrs. Mackay makes positive denial. In her own defence and in mitigation of damages, Mrs. Mackay alleges that Mrs. Blake "has an ungovernable temper and is of a jealous disposition," that she had no love for her husband, whose good name she sought to injure by circulating defamatory reports regarding him; that she told many persons "she despised and hated her husband and desired to ruin him, and that in 1905 and on numerous occasions subsequent thereto she threatened to kill her husband."

Mrs. Mackay's formal answer. Mrs. Mackay's answer and cross-complaint, which was prepared and filed in her behalf by her attorney, Arthur C. Train, is as follows: "New York Supreme Court, New York county: Catherine K. Blake, plaintiff, against Katherine A. D. Mackay, defendant. The defendant answered for her answer to the complaint herein: "First—Admits that she is the plaintiff to Joseph A. Blake, as alleged. "Second—Denies each and every other allegation in the complaint contained, and for reasons set out in her defence to said complaint, and in mitigation of damages, the defendant alleges: "Third—That the defendant did not become acquainted with the husband of the plaintiff until in or about the year 1905; that the plaintiff always had a jealous disposition and ungovernable temper; that at all the times mentioned in the complaint she was in defence to said complaint, and in mitigation of damages, the defendant alleges: "Fourth—That the defendant did not become acquainted with the husband of the plaintiff until in or about the year 1905; that the plaintiff always had a jealous disposition and ungovernable temper; that at all the times mentioned in the complaint she was in defence to said complaint, and in mitigation of damages, the defendant alleges: "Fifth—And further, that whereas of the facts aforesaid, the plaintiff's said husband has not lived with the plaintiff as his wife since the year 1904, long prior to the time when he first knew or had any acquaintance with the defendant, but, on the contrary, he has avoided the plaintiff as much as possible, and by mutual consent the said plaintiff and her husband have at all times since the year 1904 lived separately and apart, and since autumn of the year 1910 have maintained separate and distinct establishments."



FOREIGNERS ARE FLEEING MEXICO

Leaving the Country by Hundreds—Many British Among the Refugees. Washington, Oct. 16.—Twenty Catholics, members of the Sisterhood of the Inmaculate Word, are among the refugees now en route from Tampico, Mexico, to Galveston, Texas, on the oil tankers Hainant and Waneta. They fled from their institution at Monterrey. The tanker also has as passengers sixteen British subjects, ten Mexicans and one American. Consul Hanna, at Monterrey, reported to the State Department today that he started a train Monday with 155 Americans, bound for Tampico, on their way to the United States. Railroad traffic is suspended between Monterrey and Laredo, Texas. Mr. Hanna said the travellers were greatly fatigued, having spent twenty-one days in making the journey from Torreon to Monterrey. Travellers arriving in Monterrey from Torreon on Monday brought word that property there had not been damaged up to October 7, and that Americans were well treated, although a loan of 3,000,000 pesos had been demanded of them. They said there was no foundation for reports that the killing of Spanish subjects in Torreon. The department was informed today of the closing by the Mexican authorities of the bridge connecting Nuevo Laredo, Mexico, with Laredo, Texas. Passage is permitted only to bearers of passes issued in the United States, and employees have been given notice that they must move to the Mexican side, or seek employment elsewhere. The tanker also has as passengers two unidentified Americans are reported to have been killed at the works here, which are owned by a company of which James W. Geraud, ambassador to Germany, is president.

MRS. EATON'S MOTHER IN WITNESS BOX

Synopsis of Coal Mining Regulations.

COAL mining rights of the Dominion in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, the Yukon territory, the Northwest Territories and in a portion of the Province of British Columbia will be leased for a term of twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1 an acre. Not more than 2,500 acres will be leased to one applicant. Applications for a lease must be made by the applicant in person to the Agent or Sub-Agent in the district in which the rights applied for are situated. In surveying territory the land must be described by sections or legal subdivisions of sections, and in unsurveyed territory the tract applied for must be described by the applicant himself. Each application must be accompanied by a fee of \$5 which shall be refunded if the rights applied for are not available, but not otherwise. A royalty shall be paid on the merchantable output of the mine at the rate of five cents per ton. The person operating the mine shall furnish the Agent with sworn returns accounting for the full quantity of merchantable coal mined and pay the royalty thereon. If the coal mining rights are not being operated, such returns should be furnished at least once a year. The lease will include the coal mining rights only, but the lessee may be permitted to purchase whatever available surface rights may be considered necessary for the working of the mine at the rate of \$100 an acre.
