Hon. Mr. Young approved of the principle of the bill, which passed. The bill to alter polling district at Westfield, King's Co., was committed, and after some explanations made by Hon. Mr. Bailey, it passed.

The bill to incorporate Tabusintac Boom Co., was committed, and passed. Hon. Mr. Young presented a petition from the Corporation of St. Stephen, to enable the justices of the peace to divide division of certain property, and one from Milltown for a like purpose.

Hon. Mr. Jones presented the petition of the Common Council of St. John, relating to the Street Railway.

The bill to incorporate the Petitedale and Elgin Branch Railway was committed. Hon. Mr. Lewis in the chair.

Hon. Mr. Jones moved an amendment, giving power to build from Elgin to a harbor at Alma.

Hon. Mr. Chandler pointed out the inconsistency between the bill and the Government railway bill; the latter providing a subsidy for a railway to Elgin only.

Hon. Mr. Lewis felt much obliged to the Government for providing two railways for Albert. If the Government wished to extend it to Alma he would not object. In voting for the bill he asked if the Government would give a subsidy beyond Elgin.

Hon. Mr. Jones said he would demand it as a right; the people were entitled to it.

Hon. Mr. Young saw no inconsistency between the bill and the Government bill; the subsidy was good as far as it goes. Because the subsidy went only to Elgin the Company should not be prevented from extending the road to Alma.

The bill to incorporate the Victoria Road Granting Company, was committed, and passed with an amendment.

The bill to provide a market for St. John was committed, the Hon. Mr. Jones in the chair.

Hon. Mr. Seely moved several amendments, providing that the income of the market shall be kept separate from the city funds, and appropriated as follows: After payment of expenses \$5,000 per annum shall be paid into the east side funds; interest on debentures issued under this Act shall next be paid; and after that \$600 per annum to be used as a sinking fund; also, providing plans be made and deposited in the city clerk's office for public inspection and approval by the Common Council and Sessions. The bill passed as amended.

The bill to provide a lockup and stipendiary magistrate for Sackville was committed. Hon. Mr. Hamilton in the chair.

Hon. Mr. Young presented the bill, because the library required more funds, but agreed to let it stand over.

The bill amending the New Brunswick Railway Company was committed. Hon. Mr. Lewis in the chair, and passed.

Hon. Mr. Young presented petitions from Sussex praying for a Division of that parish into three parishes. The bill to establish an additional polling place at Bright, Northumberland was committed and passed.

The bill to enable the justices of the peace of Charlotte to divide certain property was committed. Hon. Mr. Robinson-Owen in the chair. Passed.

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.
FREDERICTON, March 31st, 1874.
On Monday Newcastle (Queens) Railway bill, Hillsboro Turnpike Company bill, and bill to incorporate Elgin manufacturing Company passed. Afternoon and evening were taken up with bill to provide attachment of property by creditors for debt. Former part of bill affects only contracts in which money is involved and latter excepts those who fraudulently conceal property, certain officers of law who retain monies in their hands &c. The bill passed without division but progress was reported to enable Attorney General to add a few minor amendments when it will be finally agreed to.

Hanington's bill to enable Judges of County Courts who may be called to try case in a county out of their regular jurisdiction in which regular jurisdiction is prevented by relationship or other interest from presiding, to issue papers, &c. from their own chambers, was committed and passed to last section when, on suggestion of Attorney General progress was reported to enable him to add section providing that Judge for Victoria County court shall for the present reside in Madawaska.

Frederickton, 31st.
Wedderburn committed bill to abolish Legislative Council and made an hour's speech. He thought measure should pass because our powers of legislation were limited now, and experience has shown checks not needed to any extent. Vacancies are not filled in that body, while in past four years election law, school law, common law procedure bill, railway bills, and other important measures have engaged attention of House, Upper House has not found it necessary to amend any of these. Lieut. Governor and council, Governor General and Imperial authorities are sufficient check, and the ten thousand dollars that body costs the country may be more judiciously spent in other services. At close of his speech debate adjourned till to-morrow.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.
FREDERICTON, March 31st, 1874.
On Monday nothing of importance took place. To-day New Brunswick fire insurance bill agreed to.

Robinson-Owen presented petitions and bill to divide Charlotte County. Government Railway bill was re-committed and discussed. Young advocated it strongly, showing that this is an age of railways and to keep pace with it we must build them. He showed that the scheme was not nearly so visionary and large as the lobbyist act. That provided for expenditure of \$5,000,000 dollars while this was only for half that sum. That scheme had proved most successful notwithstanding the prediction of failure and he argued a successful result to this later scheme. He went at length into the financial position of the Province, showing from our present revenue and expenditure that in 1877 the Province would have \$51,000, in 1881, \$88,000, and in 1891, \$123,000 yearly to meet interest on debentures without touching our Crown Lands or receiving any of our doubtful claims. He believed the ordinary revenue of the country would satisfy the claims under the bill.

Jones opposed bill, arguing it was too large for the province and its finances. He believed each road ought to be considered on its individual merits.

Hanington reviewed the railway history of the province and gave an earnest support to bill.

McNery believed the scheme to be fraught with danger and strongly opposed it.

Robinson-Owen, Seely, and Jones opposed bill. They considered the scheme deceptive, as five thousand dollars could not secure the construction of a mile of railway, but if it could the bill would overwhelm the country with debt.

GOVERNMENT HOUSE OTTAWA.
Monday, 7th day of April, 1873
PRESENT:
HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR GENERAL IN COUNCIL.

ON the recommendation of the Hon. the Minister of Marine and Fisheries and under the provisions of the 19th clause of "The Fisheries Act" His Excellency has been pleased to make the following Regulations:

"No person shall fish for, catch, kill, buy, sell or have in possession any Bass between the first day of April and the first day of August in each year, in the Province of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, nor at any time shall Bass of a less weight than two pounds be fished for, caught, killed, bought, sold or have in possession, and if caught by accident in nets or other fishing apparatus lawfully used for other fish, young Bass of less than two pounds weight shall be liberated alive at the cost and risk of the owner of the fishery on whom in every case, shall devolve the proof of such actual liberation: Provided, that nothing contained in this regulation shall prevent any person from fishing for, catching, or killing Bass at all times by means of angling with a hook and line; but the possession of Bass or of any fish so caught shall impose on the possessor, purchaser or seller the burden of proving the lawful capture thereof."
