### LOCAL LEGISLATURE

House Will Prorogue To-day

#### LIQUOR BILL PASSED

The Bill Relating to Public Domain Still Before The House.

(Special to Events)  
FREDERICTON, March 21.—The liquor bill forbidding the transportation of liquor to Scott Act counties was passed to-day also the bill to increase the fees of peddlars. The house will prorogue to-morrow. All the bills have been passed except the one relating to public domain which is having an amendment added in reference to Boom Company.

FREDERICTON, March 20.—Today for the first time this session, the house met in the morning.

The following bills were read a third time: Granting exemption from taxation from J. & C. Hickman's flour and grist mill at Port Elgin; incorporating the St. Croix Water Power Co.; relating to the city of Moncton; relating to the town of Newcastle; relating to the Provincial Hospital.

The bill in regard to the international railway was given a second reading as was the Judicature Act.

It was announced by Premier Tweedie that the bill in amendment to the Succession Duties Act will not be passed by the government.

Mr. Allen, from the select committee appointed to consider the Judicature Act, presented a report recommending the bill to the favorable consideration of the house.

In the committee of the whole house the act to extend the exemption of butter and cheese factories from taxation was considered and agreed to, after which recess was taken for a short time.

J. E. Stewart, one of the gentlemen chiefly interested in the Tobique and Campbellton Railway, is here to-day. Mr. Stewart, is making arrangements for a visit to Ottawa of a delegation to place before the minister of railways the claims of the road to government aid. Among those who will make the trip are Messrs. Tweeddale, Burgess and Burns, M. P. P's, and Messrs Stewart and N. H. Murchie.

### RESTIGOUCHE BOOM COMPANY

FREDERICTON, March 17.—Promoters and opponents of the bill to amend the act incorporating the Restigouche Boom Company held a conference with Premier Tweedie this morning and consented to the withdrawal of the bill. The question in dispute is to be dealt with by the general act introduced in the legislature by Mr. Tweedie yesterday.

The tobacco jar presented to local curlers by G. W. Allen M. P. P. was won last evening by Dr. Hanney.

The public accounts committee spent this morning going over the accounts of highway superintendents for the counties of Carleton, Charlotte, Albert, Gloucester, Kent and Westmorland. While there was some criticism by opposition members it was shown that the returns submitted under the new highway act are much more satisfactory than prevailed under the old system.

### 2,500 BRITISH TROOPS HUNTING DOWN ZULUS

Reports from South Africa Say the Situation is Menacing

LONDON, March 20.—Reports from Zululand and Natal says there is continued great anxiety over the menacing attitude of the Zulus, despite the fact that the 2,500 British troops in the field have destroyed several of the natives' headquarters by shrapnel bombardment.

Many of the headmen have made submission to Colonel MacKenzie at his headquarters at Mapamplo, but the real force are hiding in the bush. Reinforcements of troops and artillery have been sent northward from Durban.

### Judgment in Loggie vs Montgomery Et Al.

In the Equity Court this forenoon judgment was given in the case of Loggie vs. Montgomery et al. The defendants are Mr. W. S. Montgomery, of Dalhousie N. B., and Mr. Richard O'Leary of Richibucto, N. B. Mr. Montgomery a short time ago purchased a lot of land in Loggieville in his own name, but for himself and Mr. O'Leary with the intention of erecting on the same a store, and of entering into business in competition with the plaintiff. A water pipe from a certain spring to the plaintiff's mill ran diagonally through the lot of land purchased by the defendants. When the latter began to excavate they found the water pipe only two or three feet below the surface, and the plaintiff obtained an injunction to restrain the defendants from excavating alleging that by so doing the water pipe would be damaged. The plaintiff claimed a sole right to the water pipe under two leases and by prescription, but the court held otherwise, dismissing the bill with cost. Messrs. Tweedie & Haviland and Attorney General Pugsley appeared for the plaintiff; Mr. R. A. Lawlor, Mr. Geo. W. Allen and Mr. M. G. Teed for the defendants.—Globe.

### A. Q. & W. ROAD

Work will be Pushed Ahead This Season.

John LeMasurier of Paspébiac was in town this week looking up some horses with a view to purchasing. He wants for work on the Atlantic, Quebec & Western railway construction during the coming year. He informed Events that preparations were being made for pushing the work ahead rapidly this season, and a large number of men will be employed. Last year about ten miles of roadbed was graded.

#### QUICK WORK.

What is probably a record was recently made by I. C. R. men at the runoff that occurred a few days ago one mile west of Dalhousie Junction, on the northern division. Conductor John Doyle's special, east bound, a double header and thirty-four heavy freight cars left the rails at this place. The cause of the derailment was a broken rail and the entire train left the track. The accident happened at 2.20 o'clock in the morning. Conductor Doyle at once communicated with Superintendent Evan Price at Campbellton, who went down to the scene with an auxiliary car and crew. By 6.30, four hours and ten minutes after the runoff had occurred, the entire train was underway again for Moncton. The time included some repairs made to cars and engines which were slightly damaged. The roadbed was considerably shaken up and trackmaster Fawcett with his track crew had the broken rails replaced and the track clear by eight o'clock. Considering the large number of cars that left the rails, the nature of the runoff, and the size of the locomotives, those who are in a position to know consider the replacing of the train and the clearing of the tracks establishes a record in that line and much credit is due the different crews having the work in hand.
