### THE THAW TRIAL.

(Continued from page 1.)

Mr. Littleton then read the codicil to the jury. The codicil, it will be remembered, provided a number of bequests to lawyers and others to aid alleged victims of Stanford White to prosecute claims for damages against him, and for the prosecution of all persons engaged 'in such awful practices as said Stanford White."

Among those whom the funds, were made available were R. Ross Perry, of Washington: Dr. Charles H. Pankhurst and Anthony Comstock.

Thaw named a number of young women and girls now on the stage as possible claimants against White.

Following the reading of the codicil, Mr. Littleton created something of a stir by calling Anthony Comstock to the stand—his first appearance in the case. Mr. Comstock said he was Vice-President of and special agent for the Society for the Suppression of Vice and inspector in the post office department, having held these position for many years.

Mr. Comstock said that Thaw called
at his office in February, 1904, and complained of a party who was wronging
young girls. Thaw went into details,

munications from Thaw-one of the pa-pers being a diagram of the premises where he declared evil men were carry-

where he declared evil men were carrying on criminal practices.

Thaw declared that workmen on buildings near these premises had heard young girls scream, and suggested that men be sent to watch the entrance to the place. Thaw also said he had communicated with the Secretary for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children, suggesting that a search warrant be issued and an investigation be made of the house, which was located in 22nd street.

"Thaw told me he had been followed to my office the second time by men who were employed to watch him," continued the witness. "I sent several men out in the hallway to see if any one was there."

Mr. Jerome objected to the witness

out in the hallway to see if any one was there."

Mr. Jerome objected to the witness telling the result of his search, but it came out in the discussion that no one had followed Thaw.

"When Thaw came back to see me the third time," continued Mr. Comstock, "I told him I had been unable to secure any evidence, as the house in 22nd street seemed to be closed. He said he would furnish the names of several girls who had been there. I told him it would be better to corroborate their stories and we talked the matter over some little while."

Comstock here identified three more letters from Thaw, one having been received as late as April, 1906, two before the tragedy

Mr. Littleton first read to the jury communication from Thaw to Comstock, written in November, 1904. It at. to give in detail a des of the 24th street house, with crude diagrams appearing here and there in the text. Thaw declared that one room was fur

Thaw declared that one room was furnished like a forest, and that secret stairs led from it to the room of the mirrors. The door in the first room was hard to find, the letter declared, and there was no escape for the young girls who were drugged. Thaw claimed that six or seven "criminal scoundrels" controlled the place and that three or four decent young men who did not know of the criminal acts often frequented the place.

"Thousands of crimes have been committed there and many felonies," Thaw wrote, and added that there was a little room to which access was gained by a door behind a picture.

"In this room," the letter went on, "there is a valuable French painting of n woman and of peculiarly infamous suggestivity."

gestivity. In another letter Thaw suggested that

patterson and children, Mr. and Mrs. Impures working on a building adjoining the 24th street house might be induced to drop some heavy article through the skylight and reveal what was below. Thaw also called attention to the fact that there was a libel suit in Paris instituted by a young woman who had been mentioned as posing for the picture previously complained of. Thaw declared that the houses in 22nd and 24th streets were "consecrated to orgies by a gang of rich criminals."

Thaw suggested that one copy of one of his letters be sent to District Attorne Jerome, and Thaw also suggested that if Mr. Comstock needed more funds to carry on the enquiry he might ask Miss Helen Gould for assistance in that line. Giving the name of a young actress, Thaw described at length what he said was an effort to save this girl from the blackguard." Thaw said he enlisted a prominent man in the cause, who was at first loath to believe that such practices as complained of existed, but afterwards was convinced. This man threw what protection he could about the girl, but when he had gone abroad "the blackguard got her."

While three persons in this State last year died the terrible death which rabies brings, the year before there were syn daths. three persons in this State last year deat the terrible death which rabies brings, the year before there were svn daths from this caus, and it is not reassuring that the grand total of rabies cases entered upon the record last year was 1,170, against the total of 1,988 for the year just closed. The trouble not only remains, but increases. There have been some new outbreaks of rabies in this part of the State—at Orange, where dogs were bitten in that town and Warwick; in Northfield, West Wothington and Cummington. The collar of one dog which was shot in Hampshire county showed that the animal belonged to Torrington, Conn., which illustrates how far a mad dog is liable to run, spreading trouble along the way.—Springfield Republican. publican.
