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UNITED STATES.

Budget of News from Over the Border.

Rev. Dr. Worthington, of Detroit, has been elected bishop of the Nebraska diocese of the Protestant Episcopal Church.

It is understood the bonanza farm of C. F. Kinney, near Valley City, Dakota, has been sold to Samuel K. Bester, of Geneva, N.Y., for \$150,000.

A four-year-old Chicago girl on Friday afternoon quarrelled with a playmate only six months her senior, struck him with a hatchet and fractured his skull.

The Grand Lodge of Good Templars, representing 200,000 members from all parts of the world, convened Tuesday at Washington in its thirtieth annual session.

The colossal bronze statue of Martin Luther at Washington recently withstood a severe hail storm, and was severely damaged.

Asbury Park, N.J., has come into possession of \$10,000 left him some years ago by an aunt. He was out of work and in great need.

It is reported in Washington that General Swain will be asked to render an enormous amount of relief to the people, and reform in the Government pointed out by your platform.

Pleno-Pneumonia among Cattle in New York. A doctor in the State Board of Health reports that in the State of New York, in one place four or five hundred cattle were housed and slaughtered.

Reports from all parts of the United States are that the apple crop ever known and a very good prospect for an enormous crop of small fruit. Peaches, however, will be only about half a crop.

At the funeral of the Rev. C. C. Thayer, a fireman in Williamsburg, N.Y., Thursday, Miss Crough charged her stepmother with murdering her father. The body was placed in a vault pending an investigation.

Owing to daily applications for the incineration of bodies the trustees of Lemoine Crematory, Washington, Pa., have decided to permit the use of the crematory to residents of Washington county.

The lynching of Miles Petley, a negro, at Elizabethtown, Ky., for an alleged assault, causes great excitement among the coloured people there. Three hundred colored men held a secret meeting and resolved to leave the county.

Eight Welsh choir, aggregating a thousand singers, from neighbouring counties, convened at the Elstfield at Wilkesbarre, Pa., recently. Prizes for one to three hundred dollars were awarded. The attendance was enormous.

In the Iowa Medical Convention Wednesday President Robinson urged the enactment of laws governing the qualifications and conduct of practitioners. He said the action of other States had made Iowa too congenial a place for quacks.

GREAT BRITAIN.

Items of Interest from the United Kingdom.

Moody and Sankey closed a successful mission to Oregon Monday. They will sail for America July 24th. The London Economist says the feature of the week on the Stock Exchange was the continued general depression in American railway securities.

The remains of Dennis Deary, the dynamite worker who died on Chatham prison, were buried Monday at Sandown. There was a large number of Northamptonshire residents and to the masses of English by fighting who he considers the abuse of the pen and civil life, and he says he intends to devote himself to this work for at least the remainder of the present year.

Death from Eating Canned Meat. LONDON, May 22.—The prejudice against American tinned meats has been revived by a sad event which occurred today at Scarborough. A large quantity of tinned corned beef was sent from Chicago, and known here as "Chicago Brand."

General activity prevailed at Woodhead arsenal. A portion detachment has been ordered to hold itself in readiness to proceed to the Nile. Large steamers are loading in a day's competition. There is intense excitement in the town, and the event has caused a sensation in London, and especially in Parliament.

At a Liberal meeting in Leeds Tuesday a resolution was adopted expressing confidence in the wisdom of Mr. Gladstone's resolution as originally offered, but it was too much for the meeting, and they struck it out.

The Pall Mall Gazette says in recent correspondence with France Earl Granville agreed to the principle of a multiple control of the French vineyard for several weeks. The Cabinet has decided to accept the French proposal to evacuate Egypt in three years.

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FOREIGN INTELLIGENCE.

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ASIA.

General Gleanings from Distant Lands.

The cholera at Calcutta is increasing. There were 253 deaths in the week ending April 19th.

China has conferred upon Admiral Lespès, commander of the French fleet in Chinese waters, the order of the double dragon, which is a piece of silk with a gold fringe.

Rev. Mr. Shaw, the "martyr missionary," who was some time taken prisoner by the French at Tamatave, has returned to London from the Continent, where he was travelling for the benefit of his health.

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AFRICA.

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A secret society of French, Irish, and Arabs meets daily at Cairo.

Large reinforcements of British troops are being sent to Zulu land, where a disturbed condition of affairs in that region.

The Khedive of Egypt has written to the Queen Victoria asking that Col. Baker be reinstated in the Egyptian army in view of his great services.

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
