In an election a few days ago to fill a vacancy in the French Chamber of Deputies for the Department of Bordeaux, the General Bonaparte received 59,000 against 35,750 for M. Clémence, opponent candidate.

A MOVEMENT is on foot to form a company to build and equip a first-class hotel, on Bellevue farm, near the harbor's mouth, overlooking Hillsborough Bay. This certainly seems to be a very desirable locality for a hotel of this kind, and we trust the undertaking will be a success.

In Halifax, the other day, the jury, in the case of William Proser and Mrs. Doyle, tried for the murder of Peter Doyle, after being out for 48 hours, brought in a verdict of guilty against Proser, with a recommendation to mercy, and acquitted Mrs. Doyle of being an accessory before the fact.

The Northern Light got clear of the ice at Soreau, on Saturday morning last and made her way without much difficulty to Pictou, arriving there about 2 o'clock p. m. She returned to Soreau about 11 o'clock on Sunday, having on board 17 passengers. She left Soreau again for Pictou about daylight Monday morning.

The brigantine Nora, 215 tons register, owned by Messrs. Angus McMillan and Robert T. Holman, of Summerside, which recently went ashore at Santa Cruz, has been condemned and sold for the benefit of all concerned. Captain Angus MacMillan, of Point Prim, who was in charge, was in New York a few days ago, on his way home.

Mr. MURDOCH McNEILL, son of Lancelin McNeill, of Vernon River, came to his death very suddenly, a short time ago, at Cuba, W. I. Young McNeill was mate of the schooner J. C. Hall, bound from Cuba to Philadelphia, and while attending to the securing of the anchor which had just been raised a windlass pulley slipped and the weight of the anchor caused the bars to revolve very rapidly. One of the bars struck him and killed him instantly.

Among the successful Medical Students at the recent annual examinations of Trinity University, Toronto, we are much pleased to notice the name of Mr. R. J. Macdonald, of Montserrat, who obtained the degree of M. D., C. M., from Trinity University, and a Fellowship Diploma from Trinity Medical College. The funeral of the late James Coleman, Superintendent of the Prince Edward Island Railway took place on Wednesday afternoon last, and was largely attended. The Railway employees and many of our most prominent citizens walked in the procession. The funeral services were held in St. Paul's church, the interment made there to the Railway Station, whence the remains were taken by train to Sherwood Cemetery. As a mark of respect to his memory the passenger trains were draped with crepe.

DUBLIN, April 12.—The Privy Council has declined to proclaim Louth under the Criminal Act as a prelude to the suppression of the National League.

The Princess Victoria received from her patients to-day a birthday present of a diamond necklace. It is reported that the Princess has voluntarily agreed to a postponement of her engagement to Prince Alexander.

LONDON, April 12.—Mr. George, Chancellor of the Exchequer, informed the House this afternoon that holders of consols to the amount of £450,000, 000, including holders of new three per cent, had already given assent to the conversion of consols, and that the amount of trustees remaining to be given assent would be £1,000,000.

Mr. Fernell moved that the House adjourn, that he might call attention to the "Outrageous conduct of the authorities at Ennis on Sunday last in attacking people. The conduct was partially an enforcement of martial law, and went beyond the powers conferred by the Government Act."

After a spirited discussion the motion to adjourn was rejected, 249 to 174.

Mr. Ritchie then formally moved the second reading of the county government bill.
