24 HOUR CLOCKS.

AfNew Timepiece that Boes Away with the Old-fashloned A.M. and P.M.

New York, Nov. 17.—"There is something new," said a down town clock manufacturer yesterday, as he pointed to a queer looking clock hanging near his door. "That is a twenty-four hour clock, and I think the first one in the city. I marks the hours from one up to twenty. marks the hours from one up to twenty-four. It has just been finished, and is one of the kind which is soon to be adopt-

ed by several railroads.

"The most conspicuous innovations are in the marking of the dial and the movements of the wheels that dive the hands ments of the wheels that dive the hands. The minute hand, instead of making twelve revolutions to every revolution of the hour hand, makes twenty-four revo-lutions while the hour hand passes around

"The lettering on the dial is in Arabic instead of Roman numerals, and the spaces between the figures are only half as great as on the dial of an ordinary 12-hour clock. The minute hand marks half minutes and whole minutes.

"This clock will do away with the 'a. m.' and 'p m.' which sometimes prove

"You would be surprised to see how people take to that clock. I have had any number of offers for it, but I do not care to sell it, as it is the only one I have, but I will be able to supply the care to sell it. but I will be able to supply a small part of the demand within a day or two. By that time every manufacturer will be turning out these clocks. They are something new, and that is all that New York people want. Without a doubt these clocks will soon take the place of the old fashioned time-
