ALBERTA RAILWAY ACT BEFORE THE HOUSE
The Alberta Railway Act passed its cond reading yesterday in the legislature and a number of clauses were considered in the committee of the whole house. The act is a ponderous document of two hundred and forty-three sections, and includes the most drastic clauses in all the railway acts that have been hitherto enacted in Canada, with additions that apply more particularly to the situation in this province. The minister of public works introduced the measure in a thoughtful and practical speech which evoked the hearty applause of both sides of the Railways.

Use of Railway by the Government. Under regulations that may be made by the Governor General in council or Lieutenant Governor in council the rail-way may be required for the carriage of mail, military forces and stores as exigencies demand. The exclusive use of the telegraph is reserved for the government when required. Tolls and Bylaws.

Bylaws relating to the issue of tolls shall be aproved by the government before coming into effect, and such tolls shall be charged equally to all persons, and there shall be no unjust discrimi tion against localities. Pooling of freights and tolls with other companie s prohibited. When the company overcharges extortionate toll it shall be law-ful to recover an amount equal to three times the amount unjustly exacted. Wages of Laborers.

In any case where the legislature grants aid by way of subsidy or guarantee all laborers and mechanics shall workmen in the district and in case of dispute the rate shall be fixed by the minister, and it is further stipulated relieve the company from liability from

Every railway company operating un-der a provincial charter shall make annual returns to the government of its capital, traffic and working expenses attested by the oath of the secretary and president of the company. The returns shall also be laid before the legislature within twenty-one days after the opening in each year. A return of all acci dents and casualties is also required each year. Making false returns is exceeding twelve months.
