

RUSSIA BEGINS TO EXPEL THE JEWS

From Central Provinces. Government Fears the Influence They Exert

Kiev, Russia, May 14.—The expulsion of Jews residing illegally in Kiev was resumed today. In some instances a delay has been granted to permit a settlement of their affairs, but all of those marked for expulsion must leave the city before June 14.

The order of expulsion was issued as a result of an agitation which began in the Dnieper and originally provided that on April 28 last. Subsequently the order was suspended by Premier Stolypin to permit a further examination of Jewish claims of residence.

The order was issued to other cities and towns where Jews were residing without the pale, and local commissions were appointed to revise the lists of those affected by the order with the expectation that a large proportion would be allowed to remain in their homes.

The Kiev commission has considered thus far about 1,000 cases, of which 800 have been found to be subject to expulsion. The government general has reviewed the decisions of the commission and confirmed the expulsion of 700 of those listed.

The Jews remaining in Kiev will be allowed to occupy summer villas outside the city only through special permission granted in individual cases.

25,000 Must Go. Tashkent, Asiatic Russia, May 14.—The government has ordered the expulsion of Jews from Tashkent, and has ordered the expulsion of Jews from other cities in the province.

The government recently took alarm at the growth in commercial and political influence of these Jews, and has decided to restrict their activities.

The number of Jews within this province is estimated at five million. The number without the pale is said to be less than 100,000. Of these at least 80,000 were to be expelled.

TAFI MAKES SWEEPING DENIAL

Of Charge Made by Confidential Stenographer—His Explanation.

Washington, D. C., May 15.—President Taft tonight issued a sweeping statement explaining in detail the charge made yesterday by F. N. Kerby, a confidential stenographer in the office of Secretary of the Interior Ballinger, that the president's letter of last September exonerating Ballinger was written by Assistant Attorney General Lawyer.

The president declared that after he had made a full investigation of the Kerby charges against Ballinger, and had reached a conclusion, he requested Mr. Lawyer to prepare for him a statement in line with those conclusions.

The statement thus prepared, Mr. Kerby declared, was a full and complete statement of the facts, and he stated that the present plan was to call A. C. Fraser, manager of the Merchant's Bank, this morning and Premier Rutherford on Wednesday, if there is any time remaining after Mr. Fraser's case is completed today.

It will be filled in with minor witnesses. There is a possibility of an adjournment being made on Thursday afternoon until the following Friday and Tuesday both being holidays.

House May Again Adjourn. What course will be adopted when the House meets has not yet been determined, but it is probable that an adjournment for another fortnight may be made to allow the commission to complete its labors and bring its report.

When Mr. Walsh was asked if he had heard of W. E. Clarke, president of the A. & G.
