Bishop Preaches His Third Lenten Sermon.

His Grace the Arch-

The third in the series of Lenten sermons was preached by His Grace Archbishop Howley at the R. C. Cathedral last night in presence of a large congregation. The text was: "Come Unto Me all you who Labor

and are Heavily Burdened and I will Refresh you." These words of our Divine Lord, said the Archbishop, were addressed to the people living at the present time as well as to the Jew and the Gentiles of the day on which they were uttered. The invitation was intended for sinners to whom special graces and privileges are open during the season of Lent. There was no peace and no joy greater than that which came to the soul of the sinner after a sincere confession of

ilt of the same in the Sacrament of Penance. The Archbishop then went on to give a clear explanation of what Sacrament of Penance was and the way to receive it worthily. One of the principal essentials was a hearty and sincere sorrow for the sins committed. Sorrow on account temporal loss would not do.' One hould have supernatural sorrow for on account of the injury done to God by rebelling against his holy law. If the penitent is only sorry because his sins has caused him to lose friends, pleasures, money, health, etc. he has not the right kind of contrition to ensure forgiveness of his sins. Confession, or declaring one's sins to a Priest duly ordained was also essential to the Sacrament of Penance Some people declare that it is enough

for the sinner to throw himself on his knees in the privacy of his own room and say Lord have mercy on me sinner that this is a confession ful and valid, and that their sins would be forgiven. All things are possible with God, but he has instituted an other way to accord to the sinner the forgiveness of his sins, and that i the Sacrament of Penance and aricu lar confession practised in the Catholic Church from the very beginning In order to forgive sins it is necessary that they be declared or con-fessed to another duly and validly ordained. 


