HEAD OF GANG OF CROOKS.—Bemidji, Minn., Oct. 10.—Dr. D. F. Dumas, Mayor of Cass Lake, was found guilty of arson in the third degree here last night. Dr. Dumas was charged with having attempted with Mike Davis and Martin Behan to burn and rob the post office on the morning of June 7th last, when Behan was wounded and Davis escaped after a fight with a posse. Behan's confession implicated Davis. State officers charged that Dumas was at the head of a gang of crooks who robbed safes and burned buildings for the insurance.

STORM AT BAY DE VERDE.—The recent S. E. storm at Bay de Verde did considerable damage. Moore's schr. Mary Bell and Blundon's schr. Blanche were wrecked. Most of the punts on the collar were damaged and five or six were swamped and lost irretrievably.

PRETORIAN DUE IN THE MORNING.—Shortly after 2 p.m. to-day Messrs. Shea & Co. had a telegram stating that the S. S. Pretorian which left Liverpool last Saturday was 230 miles east of this port at noon to-day. She is due here tomorrow morning.

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Revolution IN CHINA HAS BEGUN.

HANKOW, To-day.

The revolution, which has been hanging over China for months, has begun in earnest. It is a concerted movement to take possession of the Empire and declare it a republic. The noted exiled revolutionist, Sun Yat Sen, leader of the Anti-Manchu party, if his plans do not miscarry, is to be elected President. He was the delegate of the Revolutionary Party to the United States in 1910, and is believed during that tour to have made arrangements for financing the movement. Sun Yu, brother of Sun Yat Sen, now in Hankow, has been elected President of the Provincial Assembly. Tng Hua Lung, the retiring President, a noted scholar, has been elected Governor of Hu Peh. The rebels are organized and financially strong. They have confiscated the local treasuries. The banks are issuing their own paper money and redeeming government notes with these, as foreign banks are refusing government notes. Thousands of soldiers have maintained and joined the rebels. At Huh Peh, the Manchus were killed, and the terrified people are fleeing from the cities into the country. The

prisons have been opened and criminals liberated.

Destroyed Viceroy's Palace.

HANKOW, To-day.

A late message states that Chang Sha, capital of Hanan, has risen in revolt, and at Nankin, the capital of Kang Sa, the Yamen, or official residence and administration building of the Viceroy, a Tartar, have been destroyed. Two miles from Pekin the Hankow railway is being torn up and bridges destroyed. The situation is most serious. The revolutionist occupied Hankow unopposed.

Capture Large Arsenal.

LONDON, This morning.

A despatch to the Times from Pekin says the rebels have captured not only a large government arsenal at Shang Yang, but also that the capture of the mint is expected at any moment. There is a sympathetic outbreak at Canton and dangerous meetings at Nankin and other large centres.

To Act Quickly.

TRIPOLI, To-day.

General Caneco, Commander of the Italian expedition, has decided to act quickly. It is believed that the troops under him will march immediately against the positions occupied by the Turks. Reconnaissance of the desert disclosed a central body of Turkish troops with field guns, not far from the city. Nineteen more Italian transports will be escorted here.
