## MURDERER CONFESSES

### Killing Julia Con- nors, Hottville Innocent.

The murderer of Julia Connors a  
twelve year old girl has confessed to  
the crime, and Earnest Hottville the  
innocent Newfoundland boy who was ar-  
rested on suspicion is now absolutely  
cleared of the charge. A New York  
despatch of the 16th has the follow-  
ing:—

"Events moved rapidly to-day in  
the proceedings to fit the respon-  
sibility for the brutal murder of 12-  
year-old Julia Connors, in the Bronx  
last week. The father of Nathan  
Swartz, the young hanger-on of  
pugilism, who has been sought in con-  
nection with the crime, admitted to  
the grand jury that his son had con-  
fessed to him that he was guilty of  
killing the girl. Mrs. Frances Alex-  
ander, sister of the youth, corroborated  
the statement and gave the jury  
the first details of the tragedy which  
has called out all the resources of the  
local police for a week past.

"At the conclusion of hearing filled  
with sensational testimony, the  
grand jury unanimously voted in fa-  
vor of an indictment of murder in the  
first degree. On account of the late  
hour the drawing up of the bill was  
put over until to-morrow. Mrs. Alex-  
ander's repetition of the story of the  
crime as she said her brother had told  
it to her, was detailed, explicit and  
telling in its revelation of horror.

#### The Story Told by the Sister

Mrs. Alexander, according to At-  
torney Nott, told the jury that her  
brother said he had met Julia Connors  
on Saturday night and asked her to  
take a pair of opera glasses to his  
home, which is just across the hall  
from the vacant flat where the mur-  
der was committed. The young man  
said he followed the girl, and at the  
top of the stairs pushed her into the  
flat and attempted to assault her.  
The child screamed, according to the  
story of Mrs. Alexander, and then  
Nathan said he plunged his pocket  
knife into her. She continued to  
scream, the witness testified, and  
Nathan stabbed her until she finally

fell and then plunged the knife into  
her breast near the heart. Then Julia  
remained still.  
and procured the box in which the  
body was found. He placed the still  
living child into this box, after cut-  
ting off her hair, put the box on the  
dumb waiter and let it slide to the  
bottom.

Following the Body to the Cellar.

He went to the cellar and took the  
unconscious child from the dumb wait-  
er and laid her in the cellar. He then  
went home, Mrs. Alexander said he  
told her, and went to sleep.

Early the next morning (Sunday)  
he took the girl, still alive, into the  
lot where she was found. Mrs. Alex-  
ander said she threw the youth out of  
her house when she heard the tale.  
He then went to his father's place of  
business, where he told the same story  
according to the father, who corrob-  
orated the daughter's story.

Other witness were called, but their  
testimony was insignificant with that  
offered by Samuel Swartz and his  
daughter.

## To-Day's News.

Special to Evening Telegram.  
SYDNEY, Australia, To-day.  
Borden's declarations in London are  
being watched here. The general feel-  
ing of Australia seems to point to  
readiness on part of commonwealth  
claim our seat in imperial council,  
directly our share in practical defense  
of empire attains a magnitude which  
would warrant the claim. Meanwhile  
Australia is steadily proceeding on  
agreed lines in building up a efficient  
squadron.

Special to Evening Telegram.  
DUBLIN, To-day.  
Asquith last night was the recipient  
of another ovation at the hands of  
Dublinites, both inside and outside the  
Theatre Royal, where he made an ad-  
dress. Asquith who was accompanied  
by his wife was greeted by enormous  
crowds who repeated the welcome  
they gave him last night. Redmond,  
leader of the Nationalists, in intro-  
ducing the Premier to his auditors,  
said such a reception never hitherto  
had been accorded to any Cabinet Min-  
ister, and never again would be until  
Asquith came to Dublin, attending the  
King to open an Irish Parliament.  
Asquith's speech was interrupted at  
times by male and female suffraget-  
tes, several of whom were violently  
ejected from the theatre. The speech  
was a warm defence of the Irish  
cause, and characterized opposition  
to Home Rule as merely obstructive  
and chaotic, but powerless to wreck.  
The Home Rule Bill, the Premier  
said, would be sent to the House of  
Lords before Christmas. He then ad-  
ded, with patience and discipline the  
end is in sight, because no longer is  
it possible for the Lords to override  
the decision of the people. The tri-  
umph of Ireland's cause, Asquith de-  
clared, would be a first step in Im-  
perial reorganization which Home Rule  
was the one and the only solution.  
Expressing disbelief in the possibility  
of civil war in Ulster, the Premier  
repeated his previous statement that  
the Government stood ready sym-  
pathetically to consider proposals to  
strengthen and safeguard that coun-  
try. While the meeting was proceed-  
ing, extraordinary scenes were wit-  
nessed outside the theatre. Suffra-  
gettes who attempted to make a de-  
monstration were set upon by the  
populace, who tried to throw them in  
the River Liffey. The police interfered  
for their protection.
