The War Situation.

The Ypres battle is over. Even the fiercest counter-attacks have exhausted themselves and left the British absolute victors in one of the most brilliant attacks of the war. It was one of the swift, hard punches so much to General Haig's liking and more effective than his staff would have imagined. The same artillery preponderance that made the advance possible at all—though nothing can minimise the gallantry of the infantry—served to permit the consolidation of the positions won and completely to check the German counter assaults. No line can long withstand the repetition of blows such as these which win the attackers the double advantage of gains in terrain and greatly smaller losses of men.

It is not certain whether any more attacks will come this year, though the course of the Somme battle would lead us to expect them. September nears its close; October will be less favourable. November will impose a final cessation of really important operations. The campaign of 1917 is fairly well finished. The Allies can look around them with every encouragement, ahead with every encouragement. There have been uneasy murmurs among them lately, especially in England, where it has been felt that the war was halting, but that is a common sort of manifestation which need not be taken too seriously and which the last drive has doubtless already cured. Events and the situation everywhere give ground for complete confidence. In the West the German line is strained to breaking point. On the Italian front or why not say, in Austria? Cadorna is on enemy soil and pushing ahead where every mile is momentous. In Russia things are going from better to better, unless surface indications are again deceptive. Germany has had to retain their troops already ordered to the west; another ambitious, deep-laid scheme, perhaps the last to be attempted there, has gone awry. 1917 might have been the year of the great Armageddon, the anti-Christ attacked on every side, and it was in the Allies' plans that it should be. That the Russian revolution and succeeding military collapse have postponed, not prevented. It has been postponed, too, to a time much more favourable, when Russia itself will be united and powerful and America strong in the field, with unlimited strength in reserve.

But it is Germany, not the Allies, that is looking round. A remarkable suspension of the censorship is permitting the press there to talk peace unreservedly and as it pleases. The German proletariat is being "prepared," that its own peace longings may find an expression which will anticipate the direct overtures of the government which the government knows

"Lame Duck" Reaches Port.

A five thousand ton Norwegian steamer, bound from New York to France with a general cargo, put into this port yesterday in a leaky condition. On Friday night last while trying to make Cape Race the ship struck the "False Key" near St. Mary's and punched a hole in the hull on the port side about midships. The ship began to leak a great deal and the water got amongst the cargo. The captain then bore up for St. John's to find out the extent of his trouble. It is probable that the steamer will go into dry dock for repairs, and in the event of that being decided on she will discharge her cargo, likely at the Furness Wharf pier.

Child Killed When Mother Fell.

The following message was received by the Minister of Justice from C. C. Pittman, Esq. of Lamaline: "Yesterday Mrs. Amen Miller, of Muddy Hole, slipped and fell on the road with her child in her arms. The child was killed instantly, by striking the ground."

Food Inspector vs. Butcher.

The defendant did not know the law, though they were told this did not excuse them. However, in view of the surrounding circumstances they were let off with a minimum fine of \$1 and costs.
