True Heroes of the Sea

(From the New York World.)

The loss of the Florizel has its lighter side. The skill and daring and devotion that snatched forty-four persons from what seemed certain death have perhaps never been surpassed in the long record of ocean disaster. One can guess what the fate must have been from the fact that an experienced commander like Captain Martin misjudged the head-on collision. He had made against it, but the Florizel had made against it too soon. The coast was fanged with rock. The wind was driving waves over the ship with such power that the Prospero was forced to stand by all night. When daylight made it possible to begin the rescue, not only life-boats but three dories set out on the work. The sea was too rough to make shore, and a second transfer had to be made at sea of persons half-frozen and wholly helpless, by men almost as battered by five hours of ceaseless struggle and exposure as themselves. If in such circumstances most of the sea passengers perished, it was because of their slighter physique and lesser resisting powers. Nothing that could be done for them was neglected. There are few cruises and expeditions "Four is Merit" for men who turn up ships at sea and read the women and babies to a lawless death. Nothing prompts to such heroism as the Florizel rescuers showed except manly strength and stout hearts. That a man must do what he can at such a time is the simple creed of the heroes of the sea.

And the Worst is Yet to Come—

Victory Bread
Exhibition.

His Excellency the Governor opened
the Exhibition of War Bread, which
was staged by the Food Control Board,
at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon in
the British Hall. His Excellency
was accompanied by Miss Harris,
Lieutenant-Col. Knox-Nevin and Capt.
Campbell, and was met on arrival by
Hon. Dr. McGrath and H. W. LeMes-
urier, Esq., C.M.G.

In introducing His Excellency Hon.
Dr. McGrath pointed out that we
would in a short time have to use one
grade of war flour only. There was
an exceedingly good display of cook-
ies. His Excellency thought that many
had not yet come to realize the need
for economy and that in England and
Scotland for the past two years the
greatest restrictions had been practised
in the making of bread stuffs. In
the best hotels only two pieces of
bread were allowed to a meal. The
time is coming here when we shall

have to deny ourselves of the higher
grades of flour, and the object of this
exhibition was to show what can be
done when that time comes. The list
of prizes was then read by Hon. Dr.
McGrath, as follows:—

were baked in a fireless cooker. Mrs.

judges awarded two sets of prizes.
