### Chartering of Foreign Vessels.

to load with codfish for markets is open to more than passing comment as the practice leaves our own vossels idle and keeps many men unemployed who would otherwise have a way of living. The move was made at the last session of the Legislature to debar foreign-owned vessels from this trade, giving a rightful preference to British-owned carriers. The move did not come to any practical issue. and the foreign-owned vessels are again chartered. British cargoes in British bottoms should be the rule. The United States goes further, and excludes foreign masters from its veswith strong emotions as "The Wasted sels. The reason why the foreignowned ships are used is that they take freight at lower rates than the Britishowned vessels, and so the gain is to the exporters—the lower the freight, the greater the profit.
