

Greenspond Gives Monroe and Little Tremendous Reception

Hundreds Greet Bennett Candidates.

GREENSPOND, April 14.
Reception of Messrs. Monroe and Little was forwarded to Daily News, public meeting took place last night with Captain Walter Carter presiding. S. W. Hoddinott, Secretary, Chairman opened the meeting with a very enthusiastic address, pointing out the United Fishermen's Movement threw in their lot with the Bennett Party. The chairman was glad to have such a man as W. C. Winson to lead the team in Bonavista district. After calling for three cheers for Bennett, which were given heartily, he called on Captain Winson, of Westville, to address the meeting, in place of his brother, Capt. W. C. Winson, who was unavoidably absent. Capt. Winson addressed what was said by the chairman about the United Fishermen's Movement joining up with the Bennett Party, and was glad to see that we had such a team for Bonavista as Mr. Walter S. Monroe, whom he considered one of the best men of our party. He also said the United Fishermen's Movement had come to stay and asked for a straight party vote for Monroe, Winson and Little. As he concluded cheers were given for Monroe, Winson and Little. At this juncture a little interruption occurred by one of Coaker's henchmen, an individual named Coaker, who had just returned from England, where Coaker was supposed to be holding a meeting. In answer to him, Mr. Monroe said that this was one of the men who interrupted Mr. Monroe's meeting in 1919. He called for three cheers for Coaker, but was waved; our men shouting from all over the building, "Put him out." This action was immediately carried out. Coaker rowdiness was nipped in the bud and no further interruption occurred. The chairman then called Capt. Mark Bragg to address the meeting. Capt. Bragg reviewed the situation, pointing out the various advantages should the present Government be returned. Continuing he said, "Boys, who are you going to vote for, Coaker and his crowd or for the Bennett Party? As a man of the audience shouted: 'Monroe and Little.' The chairman then introduced Mr. Lewis Little, who on behalf of the people of Greenspond for the wonderful reception accorded Mr. Monroe and himself. He said that on several occasions he had met Mr. Little and was here to-night to help save the life of the country. He thanked God he could see a light through the dark cloud that was over this little country of ours, the electing to power of the Bennett Party. He spoke as a fisherman, saying how hard it was a man to eke out a livelihood in this country owing to high rate of taxation. He then referred to the Newfoundland Government, saying it was an honest contract why he was to the country in detail, the audience shouted, "Hear, hear." He asked the question: "Are we as well off now as in 1919?" and people shouted: "No, no, no." He said "that should be enough to turn any man from Coakerism." He spoke for forty minutes he concluded amidst voracious cheering and applause. The chairman then called on Mr. E. J. Dominy to address the meeting. He told the meeting that according to the messages from the different centres in the district, we would elect Messrs. Monroe and Little. The chairman then called on Mr. W. S. S. for the speech of the evening, taking the platform he was given three cheers for Bennett and Better. He started his speech with a reference to the people for the very reception he had received on the night, and told them that it far exceeded his expectations. Years ago he said that he should ever elect him as his first choice would be Bonavista Bay, not thinking at that time would ever have to do so and help his country. But the time had come and he was now seeking votes of Bonavista District for himself and colleagues. He preferred to swim with the United Fishermen and he had the honest opinion that Bonavista District would elect itself and colleagues, especially after meeting with such a reception at his first political meeting in the district. I am here to-night to help save the life of the country, and I do wish to be personal in any way. He showed up the taxation party as it is now and what it was the present party took charge of, and also what the Government was doing on salt, fish and sugar. He said that the business men running this Government to meet such a crisis was not fit time to the Government out of such incompetent hands and place it in the hands of those who could buy salt and not lose on it. Men who were competent to run their own business and therefore, he believed, competent to run the business of Government. The fishermen did not realize that they were paying an export tax on fish until the U. P. Delegates came to St. John's last fall, and we had to thank them for its removal. When the Bennett Party was returned to power, instead of an export tax the fishermen would receive a dollar per quintal as bonus. Speaking on the Humber Deal, he told the people that the Bennett party was going to have the Humber and every other Deal that would benefit the labouring classes. He asked why keep this deal a secret if it was on the square. If the Reid was going to be paid why not let the country know and how much. After talking on several other subjects and showing up what would benefit the country he closed his fifty minute address amidst the greatest enthusiasm cheers for Bennett and Better Times. Capt. Peter Roberts was next called on, and told us that he was a fisherman from a boy, and had brought home his share of fish. But to-day he was worse off than he was 20 years ago, owing to the present taxation and said it was high time to make reform by throwing out the present Government and electing such men as were now on the platform, viz., Messrs. Monroe and Little, also W. C. Winson, who was absent to-night. The last speaker was Mr. Kenneth Oakley and he briefly spoke on the transfer of Labrador to Canada, which Mr. Coaker in his only Manifesto issued so far to Skipper Jim of Twillingate says he will arrange if elected to power. The speaker said when first reading the letter he thought that part of Labrador meant the part that was in dispute between Canada and Newfoundland, but on reading the Montreal Witness under date of March 14, 2nd page editorial, he now saw it was the whole of the Labrador coast that was to be sold or transferred. He asked, "Do we want Labrador to be sold?" and the unanimous answer was, "No, no, no." This is only a gist of the speeches. Full particulars will be sent later. The O.Y.B. Band rendered selections between the speeches and was praised by Mr. Monroe for their splendid playing. 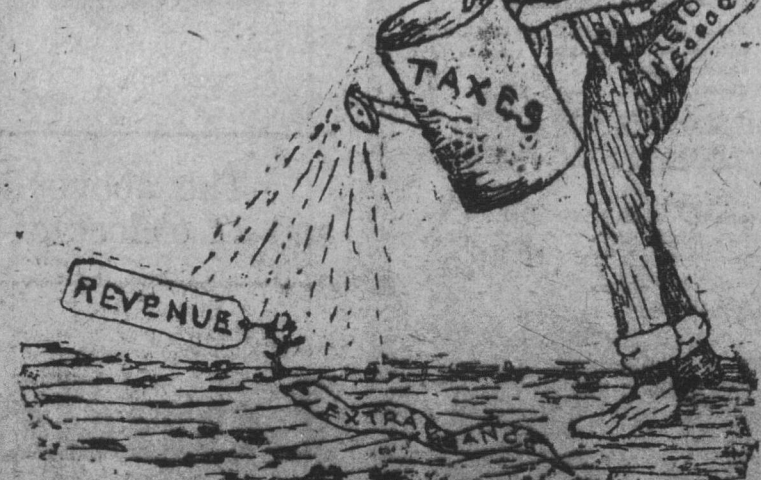
