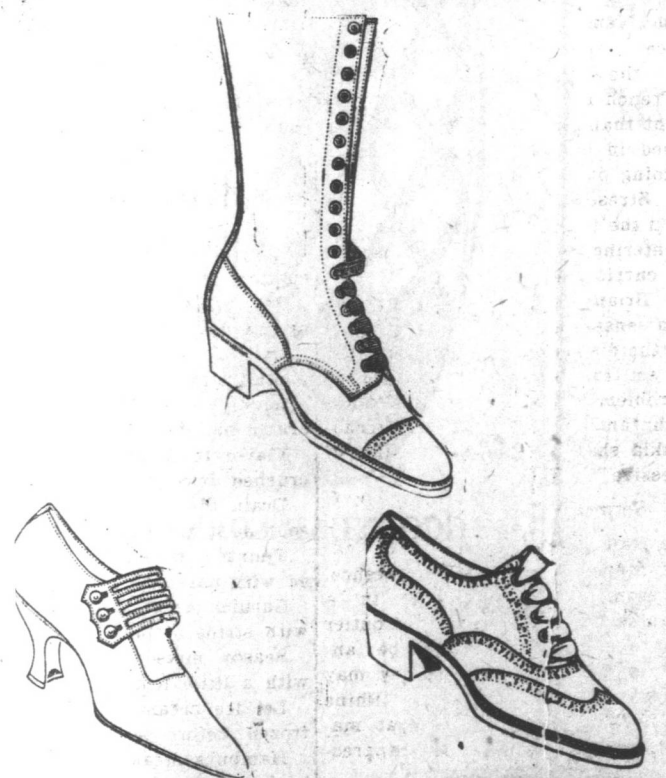

plays a tortured and suspected role;
Mr. James A. Bliss as Reginald Beres-
ford, a neighbour, and finally Mr. Geo.
Rogers as the "unknown," whose iden-

No Need for British Fascists

MANCHESTER PEOPLE READY TO
AND POLICE SHOULD EMER-
GENCY ARISE.

LONDON, Oct. 7.—(Canadian Press
Cable).—Attempts of British Fascists
to enroll as special constables have
been abandoned in Liverpool, Wolver-
hampton and Manchester.

A letter from the Chief Constable
of Manchester to the Commander of
the Manchester Fascists declining the
Fascists' offer to join the special con-
stabulary was read at a meeting of
the Manchester City Council to-day.
The chief constable said in his letter
that he was confident the citizens of
Manchester were as ready to help the
police in maintaining order in cases
of emergency in the future as they
had been found in the past.

One Councillor suggested that a
copy of the Chief's letter should be
sent to the Home Secretary, Sir Wil-
liam Joynson-Hicks, to teach him how
to maintain order. The Councillor
was referring to the Home Secretary's
recent approval of the private organi-
zation now being formed to maintain
supplies in case of such an emer-
gency as a general strike, the organi-
zation being known as the O. M. S.

By virtue of a Resolution adopted
at a regular meeting of the St. John's
Municipal Council, held the 24th day
of September, 1925, the City was di-
vided into Eleven Wards for the pur-
pose of the forthcoming Municipal
Election, the said Wards being de-
scribed and bounded as follows:—

Ward No. 1 West—This ward shall
be bounded as follows:—By a line
starting at a point in the Waterfront
River opposite the centre of Leslie
Street; thence upward along the cen-
tre of Leslie Street to Hamilton Ave.;
thence along the centre of Hamilton
Avenue to the junction of the Black-
marsh Road and the City Boundary;
thence South along the City Boundary
to the Waterfront River; thence follow-
ing the windings of the shore to the
point of commencement.

Ward No. 2 West—This ward shall
be bounded as follows:—By a point on
the North bank of the Waterfront River
at the rear of the Railway Round
House; thence along the centre of
Patrick Street to LeMarchant Road;
thence along LeMarchant Road to its
junction with the Mundy Pond Road;
thence in a straight line to the junc-
tion with Old Railway Track and
Freshwater Road; thence along Fresh-
water Road to the City Boundary;
thence westward and Southward along
the City Boundaries to the junction of
the Blackmarsh Road; thence along
the centre of Hamilton Avenue to
Leslie Street; thence down the centre
of Leslie Street to a point in the
Waterfront River opposite the centre
of Leslie Street; thence following the
windings of the shore to the point of
commencement.

Ward No. 3 West—This Ward shall
be bounded as follows:—By a line
starting at a point on the Waterfront
opposite Springdale Street; thence to
Springdale Street; thence up the cen-
tre of Springdale Street to LeMar-
chant Road; thence down the centre
of Patrick Street to the Waterfront;
thence following the windings of the
shore to the point of commencement.

Ward No. 4 West—This ward shall
be bounded as follows:—By a line
starting at a point on the Waterfront
at the centre of Stewart's Cove;
thence along the centre of Stewart's
Cove to Queen Street; thence along
the centre of Queen's St. to Barter's
Hill; thence up the centre of Barter's
Hill to Prince of Wales Street; thence
up the centre of Prince of Wales St.
to Pennywell Road; thence to Adam's
Lane; thence along the centre of
Adams' Lane to Freshwater Road;
thence along the centre of Freshwater
Road to the junction of the Old Rail-
way Track; thence back in a straight
line to the junction of Mundy Pond
Road and LeMarchant Road; thence
along the centre of LeMarchant Road
to Springdale Street; thence down the
centre of Springdale Street to the Har-
bor of St. John's; thence following
the windings of the seashore to the
point of commencement.

Ward No. 5 West—This ward shall
be bounded as follows:—By a line
starting at a point on the Waterfront
in the centre of Bowring's Cove;
thence along the centre of Bowring's
Cove to Beck's Cove; thence to Duck-
worth Street; thence Westward along
the centre of Duckworth Street to its
junction with Queen's Road; thence
Eastward along the centre of Queen's
Road to Carter's Hill; thence upward
along the centre of Carter's Hill to
Freshwater Road; thence by the cen-
tre of Freshwater Road to Adams'
Lane; thence down the centre of
Adams' Lane to Prince of Wales St.;
thence down the centre of Prince of
Wales Street to Barter's Hill; thence
down the centre of Barter's Hill to
Queen's Street; thence along the cen-
tre of Queen's Street to Stewart's
Cove (Montrose & Co.); thence down
the centre of Stewart's Cove to the
Harbor of St. John's; thence follow-
ing the windings of the seashore to
the point of commencement.

Ward No. 1 East—This ward shall
be bounded by a line commencing at
Fort Amherst running North and West
on the Eastern Boundary of the City
to the Portuguese Cove Road; thence
along the centre of the said Portuguese
Cove Road to Fraser's Lane, along
Fraser's Lane to Circular Road;
thence Westward along Circular Road
to Bannerman Road; thence along the
centre of Bannerman Road to Military
Road; thence along the centre of Mil-
itary Road to the top of Cochrane St.;
thence down the centre of Cochrane
Street to the Harbor of St. John's;
thence following the windings of the
seashore to the point of commence-
ment.

Ward No. 2 East—This ward shall
be bounded as follows:—Starting at
a point on the seashore opposite Cochrane
Street; thence continuing along the
centre of Cochrane Street to Mil-
itary Road; thence along the centre of
Military Road to Bannerman Road;
thence along the centre of Bannerman

Road to Circular Road; thence along
the centre of Circular Road to Fraser's
Lane; thence along the centre of
Fraser's Lane to Rennie's Bridge;
thence Southward along the centre of
Bulley's Hill to Rennie's Mill Road;
thence along the centre of Rennie's
Mill Road to Monkstown Road; thence
along the centre of Monkstown Road
to Rawlins' Cross; thence along down
the centre of Prescott Street to Water
Street; thence along the centre of
Water Street to Job's Cove; thence
along the centre of Job's Cove to Bon-
aventure Avenue; thence along the cen-
tre of Bonaventure Avenue to Merry-
meeting Road; thence along the cen-
tre of Merrymeeting Road to a pro-
posed new road in the Parade
Grounds; thence along the centre of
the said proposed road to Harvey Rd.;
thence along the centre of Harvey Rd.
to Long's Hill; thence along the cen-
tre of Long's Hill to Gower Street;
thence along the centre of Gower St.
to Church Hill; thence along down
the centre of Church Hill to Duckworth
Street, to Market House Hill; thence
along down the centre of Market
House Hill to Water Street; thence
across Water Street to CMT's Cove;
thence along the centre of CMT's Cove;
to the Harbor of St. John's; thence
following the windings of the seashore
to the point of commencement.

Ward No. 4 East—This ward shall
be bounded as follows:—Starting at
a point on the seashore in Clift's
Cove; continuing in a line along the
centre of the said Clift's Cove to
Water Street; thence across Water
Street to Market House Hill; thence
up the centre of Market House Hill
to Duckworth Street; thence along
the centre of Duckworth Street to
Church Hill; thence along the centre
of Gower Street to Long's Hill; thence
up the centre of Long's Hill to Harvey
Road; thence along the centre of Har-
vey Road to a proposed road in the
Parade Grounds; thence along the
centre of the said proposed road to
Merrymeeting Road; thence along the
centre of Merrymeeting Road to Bon-
aventure Avenue; thence Northward
along the centre of Bonaventure
Avenue to Allandale Road; thence
along the centre of Allandale Road to
Long Pond Road; thence along the
centre of Long Pond Road to the City
Boundary; thence Westward along the
City Boundary to Freshwater Rd.;
thence Southward by Freshwater Rd.
to Carter's Hill; thence down the cen-
tre of Carter's Hill to Queen's Road;
thence along the centre of Queen's Rd.
to Duckworth Street; thence along the
centre of Duckworth Street to Beck's
Cove; thence along the centre of
Beck's Cove to Water Street; thence
along down the centre of Bowring's
Cove to the Harbor of St. John's;
thence following the windings of the
seashore to the point of commence-
ment.

Ward No. 5 East—This ward shall
be bounded as follows:—Starting at
the City Boundary on the Portugal
Cove Road coming South along the
centre of Portugal Cove Road to Bul-
ley's Hill; thence along the centre of
Bulley's Hill to Rennie's Mill Road
to Monkstown Road; thence along
the centre of Military Road to Bon-
aventure Avenue; thence along the cen-
tre of Bonaventure Avenue to Allen-
dale Road; thence along the centre of
Allandale Road to Long Pond Road;
thence along the centre of Long Pond
Road to the City Boundary; thence
by the City Boundary to the point of
commencement.

Ward 11, Southside—This ward
shall be bounded as follows:—All that
section of the Municipality on the
Southside of the Harbor extending
from Fort Amherst to the City West-
ern Boundary.
